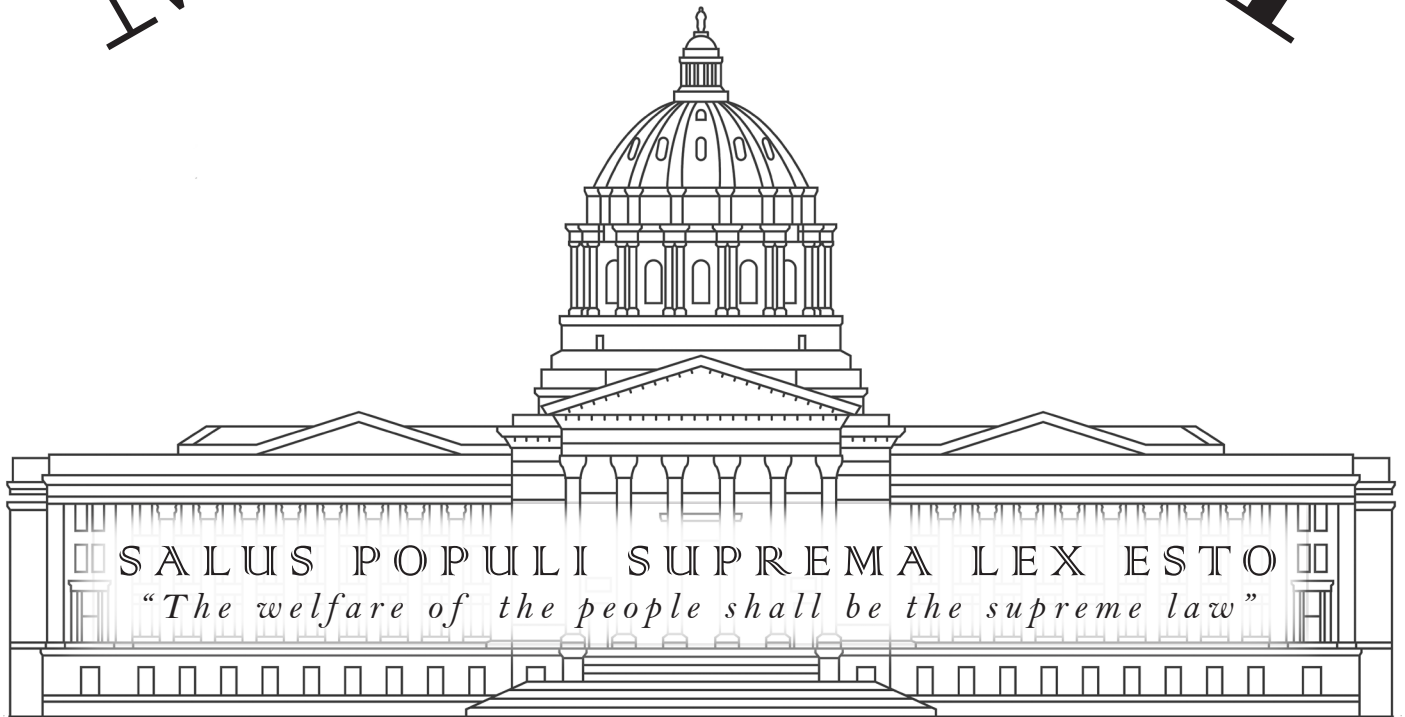

HOW TO CITE RULES AND RSMO

RULES

The rules are codified in the *Code of State Regulations* in this system–

and should be cited in this manner: 3 CSR 10-4.115.

Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraphs 1., subparagraphs A., parts (I), subparts (a), items I. and subitems a.

The rule is properly cited by using the full citation; for example, 3 CSR 10-4.115, NOT Rule 10-4.115.

Citations of RSMo are to the *Missouri Revised Statutes* as of the date indicated.

Rules appearing under this heading are filed under the authority granted by section 536.025, RSMo. An emergency rule may be adopted by an agency if the agency finds that an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare, or a compelling governmental interest requires emergency action; follows procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances; follows procedures which comply with the protections extended by the Missouri and the United States Constitutions; limits the scope of such rule to the circumstances creating an emergency and requiring emergency procedure, and at the time of or prior to the adoption of such rule files with the secretary of state the text of the rule together with the specific facts, reasons, and findings which support its conclusion that there is an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare which can be met only through the adoption of such rule and its reasons for concluding that the procedure employed is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances.

Rules filed as emergency rules may be effective not less than ten (10) business days after filing or at such later date as may be specified in the rule and may be terminated at any time by the state agency by filing an order with the secretary of state fixing the date of such termination, which order shall be published by the secretary of state in the Missouri Register as soon as practicable.

All emergency rules must state the period during which they are in effect, and in no case can they be in effect more than one hundred eighty (180) calendar days or thirty (30) legislative days, whichever period is longer. Emergency rules are not renewable, although an agency may at any time adopt an identical rule under the normal rulemaking procedures.

EMERGENCY AMENDMENT

19 CSR 30-1.002 Schedules of Controlled Substances. The department is amending section (1).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates the Schedules of Controlled Substances to be consistent with 21 CFR Part 1308.

EMERGENCY STATEMENT: The United States Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) continually evaluates substances to determine their clinical application and potential for abuse. Based on their evaluation, the DEA issues scheduling actions to place substances in the appropriate controlled substance schedules. The majority of these scheduling actions consist of temporarily and permanently scheduling newly-discovered illicit substances in Schedule I. Proper scheduling of these substances allow law enforcement to take action to prevent the further distribution of these substances. Scheduling substances in Schedules II-V allows practitioners to be informed about the potential for addiction/abuse of the substances and prescribe the substances appropriately. Section 195.015, RSMo charges the department with similarly controlling substances as they are controlled under federal law. Section

195.015.4 requires the Department of Health and Senior Services to submit emergency rules to the Secretary of State within thirty days of a federal scheduling action to allow for similar inclusion, rescheduling, or deletion of controlled substances with this schedule. While this time frame is difficult to achieve given the various approvals and reviews needed prior to the Department scheduling any rule with the Secretary of State, the Department still acts to effectuate these scheduling actions as quickly as possible. This emergency amendment includes all federal scheduling actions since the last amendment of this rule effective March 2204. This emergency amendment is necessary to protect Missouri’s governmental interest in keeping its controlled substances schedules up-to-date as much as practically possible in order to protect its citizens and to aid law enforcement in its prosecution of those who illegally distribute these substances. As a result, the Department of Health and Senior Services finds a compelling governmental interest, which requires this emergency action. A proposed amendment, which covers the same material, is published in this issue of the Missouri Register. The scope of this emergency amendment is limited to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended in the Missouri and United States Constitutions. The Department of Health and Senior Services believes this emergency amendment is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances. Subject to section 536.025, this emergency rule was filed September 24, 2024, becomes effective October 8, 2024, and expires April 5, 2025.

(1) Schedules of Controlled Substances.

(A) Schedule I shall consist of the drugs and other substances, by whatever official name, common or usual name, chemical name, or brand name designated, listed in this section. Each drug or substance has been assigned the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Controlled Substances Code Number set forth opposite it.

1. Opiates. This rule applies to **[any source that emits sulfur dioxide (SO₂)] owners and operators of indirect heating sources that emit sulfur dioxide (SO₂) and have a total capacity greater than three hundred fifty thousand British thermal units (350,000 Btus) per hour actual heat input.** The following exceptions apply to any source not listed in Table I of this rule. Upon request of the director, owners or operators must furnish the director information to confirm that an exception criterion is met^[.]:

(A) Individual units fueled exclusively with natural gas (as defined in 40 CFR 72.2), liquefied petroleum gas as defined by American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) International, ultra-low sulfur distillate fuel oil with a maximum fuel sulfur content of fifteen (15) ppm, or any combination of these fuels **[as of December 31, 2016]**, and this exception is determined by complying with the recordkeeping requirements in **subsection (4)(C)** of this rule;

(C) Individual units subject to a more restrictive SO₂ emission limit or more restrictive fuel sulfur content limit under –

1. 10 CSR 10-6.070; or
2. **[Any federally enforceable permit] Missouri's federally approved state implementation plan.**

(2) Definitions. *[Definitions of certain terms specified in this rule may be found in 10 CSR 10-6.020.]*

(A) **Indirect heating source** – A source operation in which fuel is burned for the primary purpose of producing steam, hot water, or hot air, or other indirect heating of liquids, gases, or solids where, in the course of doing so, the products of combustion do not come into direct contact with process materials.

(B) **Stationary source** – Any building, structure, facility, or installation which emits or may emit any air pollutant subject to regulation under the Clean Air Act. Building, structure, facility, or installation includes all pollutant emitting activities that are located on one (1) or more contiguous or adjacent properties and are under common control of the same person(s).

(C) Definitions of certain terms specified in this rule, other than those defined in section (2) of this rule, may be found in 10 CSR 10-6.020.

(3) General Provisions.

(A) SO₂ Emission Limits. Owners or operators of sources and/or units listed in Table I of this rule must limit their SO₂ emissions as specified.

[(D)](C) Compliance Determination. Compliance must be determined as follows:

1. For sources and/or units listed in Table I of this rule already subject to an SO₂ Continuous Emission Monitoring System (CEMS) requirement, SO₂ CEMS data[; and]—

A. SO₂ CEMS are not required for the following cases:

(I) Units fueled exclusively by natural gas and not using any secondary fuel; or

(II) Units fueled by natural gas and only using fuel oil for less than forty-eight (48) hours annually and only for qualifying situations (e.g., testing, maintenance, or operator training). The forty-eight- (48-)[/]hour annual limit for the use of fuel oil as a secondary fuel does not include qualifying curtailment events and compliance must be demonstrated using paragraph (3)[(D)](C)2. of this rule; and

Report any excess emissions other than startup, shutdown, and malfunction excess emissions already required to be reported under 10 CSR 10-6.050 to the staff director for each calendar quarter within thirty (30) days following the end of the quarter. In all cases, the notification must be a written report and include, at a minimum, the following:

A. Name and location of source;

B. Name and telephone number of person responsible for the source;

C. Identity and description of the equipment involved;

D. Time and duration of the period of SO₂ excess emissions;

E. Type of activity;

F. Estimate of the magnitude of the SO₂ excess emissions expressed in the units of the applicable emission control

regulation and the operating data and calculations used in estimating the magnitude;

G. Measures taken to mitigate the extent and duration of the SO₂ excess emissions; and

H. Measures taken to remedy the situation which caused the SO₂ excess emissions and the measures taken or planned to prevent the recurrence of these situations;

[2. Maintain a list of modifications to the source's operating procedures or other routine procedures instituted to prevent or minimize the occurrence of any excess SO₂ emissions;]

[3.]2. Maintain a record of any applicable data, calculations, results, records, and reports from any SO₂ emissions performance test, SO₂ continuous emission monitoring, fuel deliveries, and/or fuel sampling tests that are necessary to determine compliance with the requirements of this rule; and

[4.]3. Maintain a record of any applicable SO₂ monitoring data, performance evaluations, calibration checks, monitoring system and device performance tests, and any adjustments and maintenance performed on these systems or devices.

[(B) Owners or operators of sources using SO₂ CEMS for compliance must also—

1. If SO₂ CEMS is already used to satisfy other requirements (other than only to demonstrate compliance with this rule), continue to follow all correlating SO₂ CEMS requirements; or

2. If SO₂ CEMS is used only to demonstrate compliance with this rule, the SO₂ CEMS and any necessary auxiliary monitoring equipment must follow the requirements in subsection (5)(B) of this rule.]

[(C)](B) Owners or operators of sources using fuel delivery records for compliance must also maintain the fuel supplier certification information to certify all fuel deliveries. Bills of lading and/or other fuel delivery documentation containing the following information for all fuel purchases or deliveries are deemed acceptable to comply with the requirements of this rule:

1. The name, address, and contact information of the fuel supplier;

2. The type of fuel (bituminous or sub-bituminous coal, diesel, #2 fuel oil, etc.);

3. The moisture content of the coal (if applicable);

4. The sulfur content or maximum sulfur content expressed in percent sulfur by weight or in ppm sulfur; and

5. The heating value of the fuel.

[(D) Owners or operators of sources using fuel sampling and analysis for compliance must also follow the requirements in subsection (5)(D) of this rule.

(E) Owners or operators of sources using SO₂ emissions performance tests for compliance must also follow the requirements in subsection (5)(A) of this rule.]

(C) Owners or operators of sources meeting an exemption listed in subsection (1)(A) of this rule must maintain documentation of all fuels combusted in the unit(s) exempted by subsection (1)(A) and documentation demonstrating these fuels meet the exemption criteria in subsection (1)(A). Documentation demonstrating the fuels meet the exemption criteria can include but is not limited to fuel contracts that specify the maximum allowable sulfur content of all fuels combusted in the exempt unit(s).

[(F)](D) All required reports and records must be retained on-site for a minimum of five (5) years and made available within five (5) business days upon written or electronic request by the director.

[(G)](E) Owners or operators of sources subject to this rule must furnish the director all data necessary to determine compliance status.

(5) Test Methods.

(A) Owners or operators of sources **using performance tests to demonstrate compliance with this rule** must use one (1) or more of the following 40 CFR 60 test methods as specified in 10 CSR 10-6.030(22):

1. Method 1: Sample and velocity traverses for stationary sources;

2. Method 2: Determination of stack gas velocity and volumetric flow rate (Type S pitot tube);

3. Method 3: Gas analysis for the determination of dry molecular weight;

4. Method 4: Determination of moisture content in stack gases;

5. Method 6: Determination of Sulfur Dioxide Emissions from Stationary Sources;

6. Method 6A: Determination of Sulfur Dioxide, Moisture, and Carbon Dioxide from Fuel Combustion Sources;

7. Method 6B: Determination of Sulfur Dioxide and Carbon Dioxide Daily Average Emissions from Fossil Fuel Combustion Sources;

8. Method 6C: Determination of Sulfur Dioxide Emissions from Stationary Sources (Instrumental Analyzer Procedure); and

9. Method 8: Determination of sulfuric acid mist and sulfur dioxide emissions from stationary sources.

(B) For owners or operators of sources using performance tests to demonstrate compliance with this rule, the heating value of the fuel must be determined as specified in 10 CSR 10-6.040. The actual heat input must be determined by multiplying the heating value of the fuel by the amount of fuel burned during the source test period.

[(B)](C) Owners or operators of sources using *[an]* SO₂ CEMS for demonstrating compliance with this rule must –

1. If SO₂ CEMS is already used to satisfy other requirements (other than only to demonstrate compliance with this rule), continue to follow all correlating SO₂ CEMS requirements; or

2. If SO₂ CEMS is used only to demonstrate compliance with this rule, the SO₂ CEMS and any necessary auxiliary monitoring equipment must follow the requirements in 40 CFR 75 and/or 40 CFR 60, Appendices B and F. 40 CFR 75 promulgated as of June 30, 2018, *[is]* hereby incorporated by reference in this rule, as published by the Office of the Federal Register. Copies can be obtained from the U.S. Publishing Office Bookstore, 710 N. Capitol Street NW, Washington, DC 20401. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions. 40 CFR 60, Appendices B and F are as specified in 10 CSR 10-6.030(22).

11 CSR 70-2.130 Retailer's Conduct of Business. The division is adding new section (18).

PURPOSE: This amendment bans the sale of psychoactive cannabis products at retail stores.

(18) Any retailer selling intoxicating liquor shall not sell or possess any natural or synthetic cannabis derivative or any cannabinoid intended for human consumption on or about the licensed premise. As used in this section, "cannabis derivative" means all psychoactive substances derived from a cannabis plant in any form whatsoever, including hemp-derived products or any product purporting to give the psychoactive effect of cannabis.

AUTHORITY: section 311.660, RSMo Supp. [2023] 2024. This version of rule filed Feb. 8, 1973, effective Feb. 18, 1973. For intervening history, please consult the Code of State Regulations. Amended: Filed Sept. 24, 2024.

PUBLIC COST: The cost of this amendment to state agencies or political subdivisions from lost tax revenue is unknown. The

Division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control anticipates increased operational costs coming from a dedicated fund that will not require any additional general revenue funding: \$786,238 in FY26, \$588,284 in FY27, and \$597,210 in FY28.

PRIVATE COST: The lost profit for ATC licensees as a result of this amendment is unknown. Various ATC stakeholders provided the following as to their anticipated fiscal impact: no fiscal impact and lost sales estimates ranging from \$15,732 to \$240,000 per year.

IV. ASSUMPTIONS

Dept. of Public Safety - Division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control ("ATC") will need to visit liquor licensed retailers and ensure they are not selling the prohibited products disallowed by the permanent rule change.

ATC expects the rule change to directly result in the need to conduct at least an additional 600 inspections a year. Currently, the average amount of inspections an ATC agent performs per year is roughly 150. Four additional agents would be needed to absorb these additional inspections.

In Missouri, the agent to license ratio is 1:1,100. In order for ATC to continue a focus on our statutory obligations, we would

need to add 4 agents, which will reduce the license to agent ratio down to 1:871. According to the Center for Alcohol Policy, as of 2022, other like states (non-controlled states) average an agent to license ratio of 1:304.

The four additional agents is needed to allow ATC to hire an additional agent per district. The agent will be tasked educating local license holders and enforcing liquor law while also verifying retailers do not have, or have removed once notified, the banned products. Professional services costs are the costs of testing any products taken as evidence. The number of tests as well as the cost per test are estimated amounts.

State of Missouri - general revenue generated through sales tax will be negatively impacted, if liquor license holders can no longer sell these prohibited products; however, the anticipated fiscal cost is unknown.

Local Government - sales tax will be negatively impacted, if liquor license holders can no longer sell these prohibited products; however, the anticipated fiscal cost is unknown.

IV. ASSUMPTIONS

It is unknown how many or how few liquor licensees will be impacted by this regulation change. The division reached out to a list of industry members. Of the 14 that responded, 6 said that this regulation would not impact them at all. The other 8 gave a rough estimate of the loss in sales that they anticipate. The loss in sales that were estimated ranged from \$1,311/month to \$20,000/month, or \$15,732/year to \$240,000/year. We currently have 13,461 retailers licensed in Missouri. Of those, 7,905 are by the drink licenses such as restaurants, bars, and some grocery stores. 5,556 are package licenses such as convenience stores, liquor stores, and gas stations. It is unlikely that restaurants and bars carry these products, so we believe the majority of those affected would be convenience stores and gas stations, or package licenses.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

13 CSR 35-71.045 Personnel. The department is deleting sections (1), (4), and (5), adding new sections (1), (2) and (4), renumbering as necessary, and amending remaining sections.

PURPOSE: This amendment reorganizes and simplifies the requirements that individuals must complete in order to become and remain employees of licensed residential care facilities (LRCFs), the documents that LRCFs must maintain in personnel records, and the requirements governing the content of staff orientation and training. This amendment conforms 13 CSR 35-71.045 to section 210.493, RSMo, as amended by Senate Bill 40, which took effect August 28, 2023. Section 210.493, RSMo, no longer requires officers, managers, and other support staff of LRCFs to undergo the background checks mandated in section 210.493, RSMo. This amendment also conforms 13 CSR 35-71.045 to 13 CSR 35-71.015, which permits LRCFs, with the department’s permission, to hire personnel prior to completing all background checks.

[(1) General Requirements.

(A) The Licensed Residential Care Facility (LRCF) shall have a written statement of personnel practices which are approved by the governing body and provided to all staff at the time of employment.

(B) The LRCF shall evaluate and investigate application information carefully to determine whether employment or service of an applicant with the LRCF is in the best interests of the children in care.

(C) All officers, managers, contractors, volunteers with access to children, employees, other support staff and owners of such LRCF who will have access to the facilities of the LRCF shall submit to a background check and shall be found eligible for employment or presence at the LRCF as provided in section 210.493, RSMo, and 13 CSR 35-71.015 before commencing service or being afforded access to the facilities of the LRCF. These individuals shall notify the LRCF and the division of any change in circumstances which would render them ineligible for employment or presence at the LRCF. After the individual completes the background check, the LRCF shall further require all officers, managers, contractors, volunteers with access to children, employees, other support staff, and owners of the LRCF who will have access to the facilities of the LRCF to successfully complete an annual check of the Family Care Safety Registry. The LRCF shall maintain documentation of the Family Care Safety Registry checks in its personnel records.

(D) After the individual completes the background check, the LRCF shall require all officers, managers, contractors, volunteers with access to children, employees, other support staff, and owners of the LRCF who will have access to the facilities of the LRCF, and who reside outside of the state of Missouri, to successfully complete an annual background screening which shall consist of a check of the child abuse and neglect registry and a criminal background check of the state or jurisdiction in which the individual resides. LRCFs shall further implement and apply policies which require all personnel who are otherwise required to submit to a background check pursuant to section 210.493, RSMo, to immediately notify the LRCF if they are listed in a state or local government registry as

a perpetrator of child abuse or neglect, or if they were arrested or charged with any crime listed in section 210.493, RSMo.

(E) Any person who makes a materially false statement in connection with an application for licensure or relicensure as a LRCF shall be ineligible for employment or presence at the LRCF.

(F) Prior to the employment of any person for a position requiring credit hours, a degree, or both from an accredited college or university, a resume and an official college transcript, or a copy of the diploma, shall be on file at the LRCF. Any person employed in a position requiring general educational development certificate or high school diploma shall provide documentation of such within thirty (30) days of employment.

(G) An LRCF shall require the names of at least three (3) persons for each employee, volunteer, or staff person, who are unrelated to the individual, who can provide character references. At least two (2) of the three (3) persons shall be professional references from a previous employer, internship, or volunteer position. If the individual is a student then this requirement may be satisfied by providing the references from the individual’s professor, guidance counselor, teacher, or academic advisor.

(H) The LRCF shall contact all references and maintain documentation of the reference checks in the LRCF’s employee records. Documentation of the contact shall include the date, person making the contact, and the content of the contact.

(I) The LRCF shall require an annual driver record check for any staff, employee, intern, volunteer, or contract personnel who transport residents. No individual with a suspended or revoked driver’s license or record of driving while under the influence of alcohol or any other intoxicating substance within the last five (5) years shall transport residents.]

(1) Pre-Employment Requirements.

(A) The licensed residential care facility (LRCF) shall require all professional staff to provide a copy of their official college transcript or college diploma and shall keep such transcripts or diplomas on file pursuant to the requirements set forth in subsection (4)(A) of this rule. The LRCF shall require any person employed in a position requiring a general educational development certificate or high school diploma to provide a copy of such certificate or diploma to the LRCF, which the LRCF shall keep on file pursuant to the requirements set forth in subsection (4)(A) of this rule.

(B) The LRCF shall require prospective employees to submit at least three (3) character references from unrelated persons. At least one (1) reference shall be from a previous employer, supervisor, teacher, or professor. The LRCF shall contact all references and maintain documentation of the reference checks in the LRCF’s employee records pursuant to the requirements set forth in subsection (4)(A) of this rule. Documentation of the contact shall include the date, person making the contact, and the content of the contact.

(C) The LRCF shall establish a written job description for each position, which shall be given to staff at the time of employment. Each description shall describe the duties and responsibilities of the position, address supervision, required knowledge, skills, and abilities, minimum experience, educational requirements, and shall include examples of work performed.

(2) Annual Requirements.

(A) The LRCF shall conduct an annual check of the family care safety registry (FCSR) for all employees and contractors and those owners and volunteers who have

access to children. The LRCF shall maintain documentation of the FCSR checks in its personnel records.

(B) The LRCF shall conduct an annual background check for employees, contractors, owners, and volunteers with access to children who reside outside of Missouri by searching the criminal records database and child abuse and neglect registry of the states where such persons reside. If the LRCF is not legally permitted to search such databases and registries, such employees, contractors, owners, and volunteers shall conduct a background check on themselves in such databases and registries and provide the results to the LRCF.

(C) The LRCF shall require an annual driver record check for any employees, interns, volunteers, or contract personnel who transport residents. No individual with a suspended or revoked driver's license or record of driving while under the influence of alcohol or any other intoxicating substance within the last five (5) years shall transport residents.

[(2)](3) Health Verification.

(A) All staff, employees, interns, volunteers, and contracted personnel shall be free of symptoms of communicable disease or other evidence of ill health *[which]* that poses a threat to children.

[(B) Staff, interns, volunteers, and contracted personnel shall be free of any conditions which would adversely affect their ability to care for or pose a threat to children.]

[(C)](B) If the division has reason to question the capabilities of any individual working directly with children served by the LRCF, the division may require the individual to submit to a medical examination and obtain a report of an appropriate medical professional that the individual is medically fit to perform the services for the LRCF without reasonable risk to the children.

[(3)](4) Personnel Records. The LRCF shall maintain personnel records for each staff member, employee, intern, volunteer, and contracted employee as indicated below. The LRCF shall maintain the records on site and shall keep the records for at least *[five (5)] three (3)* years following the date of separation from the LRCF.

(A) For staff members and employees, the personnel record shall include –

1. Verification of education and experience, and a copy of professional license, if applicable;

2. Verification of the names of three (3) persons, unrelated to the staff member, who can provide character or professional references;

[3. A copy of the job description signed and dated by the employee;]

[4.]3. Results of annual checks of the family care safety registry;

[5.]4. Documentation that the individual has completed the background checks and that the division has found the individual eligible for employment or presence at the LRCF pursuant to section 210.493, RSMo, and 13 CSR 35-71.015;

[6.]5. Documentation *[of annual background checks for individual staff members]* that employees who reside outside of Missouri *[that are subject to the background check requirements provided for in section 210.493, RSMo, which shall include a check of the]* have completed an annual background check of a criminal records database and child abuse and neglect registry *[and a criminal background check]* of the state *[or jurisdiction]* in which *[the individual]* such employees reside*[s. LRCFs shall further implement and apply*

policies which require all personnel who are otherwise required to submit to a background check pursuant to section 210.493, RSMo, to immediately notify the LRCF if they are listed in a state or local government registry as a perpetrator of child abuse or neglect, or if they were arrested or charged with any crime listed in section 210.493, RSMo];

[7.]6. The date *[of employment, date of separation, reason(s) for separation]* that employment commenced;

[8.]7. Copies of annual performance evaluations;

[9.]8. Results of an annual driver record check for any employee, intern, volunteer, and any contracted personnel who transport residents;

[10.]9. A *[signed and dated]* copy of the *[confidentiality statement;]* following documents signed and dated by the employee:

A. Job description;

B. Confidentiality policy;

C. Discipline policy;

D. Child abuse/neglect reporting policy;

E. Critical incident reporting policy;

F. Acknowledgment of receipt of program policy;

G. Acknowledgment of personnel policy; and

H. Acknowledgment of completed agency orientation;

[11. A signed and dated copy of the discipline policy;

12. A signed and dated copy of the mandated child abuse/neglect reporting and critical incident reporting policies;

13. A signed and dated copy of an acknowledgement of receipt of program and personnel policies and manuals;

14. A signed and dated copy of the acknowledgment of completed agency orientation;]

[15.]10. Documentation that the staff member has successfully completed all **required** training *[required for the successful performance of the individual's duties];*

[16.]11. Documentation of current first aid/cardiopulmonary resuscitation training and certification **for applicable staff; [and]**

[17.]12. Documentation of current *[medical]* medication aide certification, when applicable; **and**

13. Documentation of current physical restraint training certification, when applicable.

(B) For interns, volunteers, and contracted employees who have direct contact with children, the personnel record shall include –

1. Copy of professional credentials, if applicable;

2. Results of annual checks of the family care safety registry and documentation that the individual has completed the background check process and been found eligible for service as provided in section 210.493, RSMo, and 13 CSR 35-71.015;

[3. Documentation of annual background checks for interns, volunteers, and contracted employees who have direct contact with children who reside outside of Missouri that are subject to the background check requirements provided for in section 210.493, RSMo, which shall include a check of the child abuse and neglect registry and a criminal background check of the state or jurisdiction in which the individual resides. LRCFs shall further implement and apply policies which require all personnel who are otherwise required to submit to a background check pursuant to section 210.493, RSMo, to immediately notify the LRCF if they are listed in a state or local government registry as a perpetrator of child abuse or neglect, or if they were arrested or charged with any crime listed in section 210.493, RSMo;

4. A signed and dated copy of the contract or any agreement outlining purpose of presence on site;

5. A signed and dated copy of the confidentiality policy;

- 6. A signed and dated copy of the discipline policy;
- 7. A signed and dated copy of the mandated child abuse/neglect and critical incident reporting policies;
- 8. A signed and dated copy of the acknowledgement of receipt of manuals and policies related to the agreement/contract; and
- 9. Documentation of staff orientation participation.]
- 3. Results of annual checks of the out-of-state criminal records database and child abuse and neglect registry for those interns, volunteers, and contracted employees who reside outside of Missouri;
- 4. A copy of the following documents signed and dated by the intern, volunteer, or contracted employee:
 - A. The contract or any agreement outlining purpose of presence on site;
 - B. The confidentiality policy;
 - C. The discipline policy;
 - D. The child abuse/neglect reporting policy;
 - E. The critical incident reporting policy;
 - F. Acknowledgment of receipt of program policy, if applicable;
 - G. Acknowledgment of receipt of manuals or policies related to the agreement/contract, if applicable; and
 - H. Acknowledgment of completed facility orientation, if applicable.

[(4) *Job Descriptions.* An agency shall establish a written job description for each position, which shall be made available to staff at the time of employment. Each description shall describe the duties and responsibilities of the position; address supervision, required knowledge, skills and abilities, minimum experience, educational requirements; and shall include examples of work performed. Each employee shall be given a copy of the job description for his/her position. A copy of the job description shall be signed and dated by the employee and placed in his/her file.

- (5) *Staff Orientation.* Immediately before or within one (1) week following appointment, an employee, intern, volunteer, and any contracted personnel shall be oriented to the agency's programs, practices, and the duties and expectations of his/her position. The orientation program shall include, but not be limited to:
 - (A) Agency philosophy and history;
 - (B) Agency policies;
 - (C) Agency staff roles;
 - (D) The family's role in the child's care and the worker's role and responsibilities in relation to the family;
 - (E) Complete description of the agency's program model;
 - (F) Health and safety procedures, including the use of universal health care precautions;
 - (G) Crisis intervention procedures;
 - (H) Record keeping requirements;
 - (I) Cultural diversity;
 - (J) Separation and attachment issues;
 - (K) Confidentiality;
 - (L) Substance abuse;
 - (M) Recognition of suicidal tendencies and appropriate intervention;
 - (N) The procedure for identifying and reporting child abuse or neglect, or both, in accordance with sections 210.110–210.165, RSMo;
 - (O) Agency recreation program philosophy, policy, procedures, rules, and expectations;
 - (P) Legal rights of children and their families, including basic information on the constitutional rights of children and their

families while children are in care and basic information on the Missouri juvenile justice system; and
 (Q) Procedures to follow in an emergency.]

(5) **Staff Orientation.**

(A) The LRCF shall have a written statement of personnel practices that is provided to all staff at the time of employment.

(B) Within thirty (30) days following appointment, employees, interns, volunteers, and contracted personnel shall be oriented to the facility's programs, practices, and the duties of their positions. The orientation program shall include instruction in the following areas with respect to the facility:

1. Program model;
2. Policies;
3. Staff roles;
4. Health and safety procedures;
5. Crisis intervention procedures;
6. Recordkeeping requirements;
7. Separation and attachment issues;
8. Confidentiality;
9. Recognition of suicidal tendencies and appropriate intervention;
10. Procedure for identifying and reporting child abuse or neglect, or both, in accordance with sections 210.110–210.165, RSMo;
11. Procedure for identifying and reporting the abuse of youth eighteen (18) years or older who are "eligible adults" under sections 192.2400–192.2505, RSMo, if applicable;
12. Basic information on the child welfare and juvenile justice systems, including the legal rights of children and their families; and
13. Procedures to follow in an emergency.

(6) **Staff Training.**

(A) A[n agency] facility shall [establish and submit to the licensing unit an annual] prepare a written plan of training each year for all employees and contracted personnel.

1. Employees and contracted personnel that work directly with children shall have [forty (40)] twenty-five (25) hours of training [during the first year of employment and forty (40) hours] annually [each subsequent year; and].

2. Direct care staff and immediate supervisors must maintain certification in a certified medication training program[, crisis management, a current recognized and approved physical restraint program (where applicable), first aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation] unless all medication is managed through on-site medical personnel.

3. Direct care staff and immediate supervisors must maintain certification in a current recognized and approved physical restraint program (where applicable), first aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

4. Employees and contracted personnel that do not work directly with children shall receive job-appropriate training.

(B) All training must be documented on a training database/ training log with the dates, location, subject, number of hours earned, and person(s) who conducted the training.

(C) The training may include[, but not be limited to,] short-term courses, seminars, institutes, workshops, and in-service training provided on site by qualified professionals. Activities related to supervision of the staff member's routine tasks shall not be considered training [activities] for the purpose of this rule.

(D) The training plan shall include[, but not be limited

to] training in the following areas for employees and contracted personnel who work directly with children:

1. Developmental needs of children;
2. [Child management techniques] For those facilities licensed to provide residential treatment and intensive residential treatment, training related specifically to treatment issues with emotionally disturbed, mentally ill, behaviorally disordered, medically fragile, physically disabled, and/or developmentally delayed children, as defined by the facility's program;
3. Prenatal and parenting skills, including safe sleep, for facilities licensed for infant/toddler/preschool and maternity;
 - [3.]4. Basic group dynamics;
5. Trauma-informed care;
6. Cultural sensitivity;
7. Critical incident reporting;
 - [4.]8. Appropriate discipline, crisis intervention, de-escalation techniques, and behavior management techniques;
 - [5.]9. The role of direct care and professional staff [roles in] at the operating site, including maintaining appropriate boundaries;
 - [6. Interpersonal communication;]
 - [7.]10. Proper, safe methods[,] and techniques of physical restraint, if applicable;
11. Fire prevention and reporting fires;
12. Emergency evacuations;
- [8.]13. First aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation training, including infant CPR for facilities with an infant/toddler pre-school license;
 - [9.]14. Medication training and/or certification, including training to identify changes in a child's appearance or behavior that may be related to the use or disuse of any medication, including psychotropic medications;
15. Substance abuse;
- [10.]16. Suicide prevention;
17. Human trafficking;
- [11.]18. Legal rights of children and their families, including basic information on the constitutional rights of children and their families while children are in care and basic information on the Missouri juvenile justice system; and
- [12.]19. Water safety for those agencies allowing water activities.

PROPOSED RULE

19 CSR 20-8.030 Lead Poisoning Assessment, Testing, and Reporting

PURPOSE: This rule establishes criteria for the screening and follow-up activities of children less than seventy-two (72) months of age for lead poisoning in Missouri.

PUBLISHER'S NOTE: The secretary of state has determined that the publication of the entire text of the material which

is incorporated by reference as a portion of this rule would be unduly cumbersome or expensive. This material as incorporated by reference in this rule shall be maintained by the agency at its headquarters and shall be made available to the public for inspection and copying at no more than the actual cost of reproduction. This note applies only to the reference material. The entire text of the rule is printed here.

(1) Applicability. This rule applies to health care professionals, local public health agencies (LPHAs), and others who perform blood lead specimen collections and lead case management.

(2) Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and application of this rule and shall have the meaning stated below:

(A) "Blood lead testing" shall mean the collection of a capillary or venous blood specimen for analysis of lead in an individual's bloodstream;

(B) "Capillary blood specimen" shall mean a procedure of lancing the skin and placing an approved lead collection device at the edge of the blood droplet to collect a sample of blood for analysis;

(C) "Chelation" shall mean a treatment in which heavy metals are removed from the bloodstream by means of a medication that binds with metal ions;

(D) "Confirmatory blood lead test" shall mean a blood lead test performed by venous blood specimen;

(E) "Department" shall mean the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services;

(F) "Elevated blood lead (EBL)" shall mean a blood lead level equal to or greater than three and five-tenths micrograms per deciliter (≥ 3.5 mcg/dL);

(G) "Follow-up testing" shall mean a blood lead test performed by venous blood specimen to –

1. Confirm an elevated capillary blood specimen result; and/or

2. Monitor patient treatment progression;

(H) "Health care professional" shall mean medical providers, including but not limited to physicians, nurses, pharmacists, and laboratory technicians;

(I) "Lead case manager" shall mean a licensed registered nurse, licensed medical or clinical social worker, or health educator who is supervised by a licensed medical professional and performs services for children with EBL's. The lead case manager is an agent of the –

1. Health plan for children with an EBL enrolled in MO HealthNet or Medicaid; or

2. Local Public Health Agency for children with an EBL enrolled in Fee for Service Medicaid, a private insurance company, or who are uninsured;

(J) "Lead poisoning" shall mean a condition resulting from an EBL;

(K) "Primary care provider (PCP)" shall mean the health care professional who provides medical care services and/or serves as the contact for coordinating health care services associated with a lead poisoning case;

(L) "Treatment" shall mean the medical and/or health actions and intervention procedures to be followed as the result of an identified case of lead poisoning for the purposes of lowering and maintaining the child's blood lead level below the blood lead reference value; and

(M) "Venous blood specimen" shall mean a procedure of puncturing a vein using a needle and an approved lead collection device to collect a sample of blood for analysis.

(3) Clinical Lead Education and Assessment.

(A) The primary care provider shall perform a lead risk screening, at least annually for children ages six (6) months up to seventy-two (72) months.

(B) The lead risk screening shall be conducted with the child's parent/guardian and include –

1. Educational information regarding potential lead sources and routes of exposure;

2. Educational information regarding medical and behavioral effects associated with lead exposure;

3. Completing/updating the Healthy Children and Youth (HCY) Lead Risk Assessment Guide (2023), incorporated by reference as published by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, PO Box 570, Jefferson City, MO 65102-0570, and available by the department at <https://health.mo.gov/living/environment/lead/pdf/HCYLeadRiskAssessmentGuide.pdf>. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

4. Assessing the child's developmental status as it relates to potential lead exposure; and

5. Assessing the child's nutritional status;

6. The primary care provider shall offer testing to all children under age four (4) years annually.

(4) A child's blood lead level shall be tested with the consent of a parent or guardian when –

(A) The child receives Medicaid benefits and –

1. Is twelve (12) months of age;

2. Is twenty-four (24) months of age; or

3. Has not previously tested;

(B) The child has prior blood lead testing results that necessitate follow-up testing as laid out in section 701.342.4, RSMo, and (6)(C) below;

(C) The health care professional determines blood lead testing is warranted;

(D) A "yes" or "unknown" response is documented on the HCY Lead Risk Assessment Guide;

(E) There is a child under seventy-two (72) months of age residing in a household or has recently resided in a household of another lead-poisoned child in which the department is notified of a case of lead poisoning of; or

(F) The child's parent/guardian requests blood lead testing.

(5) Documentation of Blood Lead Testing or Refusal of Blood Lead Testing.

(A) For blood lead testing, the health care professional shall document in the child's medical record –

1. The lead risk screening for children ages six (6) months up to seventy-two (72) months, at least annually;

2. That testing was offered annually for all children under the age of four (4) years;

3. Indicate capillary and/or venous blood specimen;

4. Collection dates; and

5. Blood lead level results.

(B) Refusal of Blood Lead Testing.

1. Only the parent/guardian of the child may refuse the blood lead test.

2. The refusal shall be in writing, signed by the parent/guardian, and documented in the child's medical record.

(6) Capillary Screening and Venous Blood Lead Testing.

(A) An initial capillary or venous blood specimen shall be collected in accordance with section (4) of this rule.

(B) A confirmatory blood lead specimen shall be collected when a capillary blood specimen result indicates an EBL.

(C) Blood lead testing shall be in accordance with the Missouri Guidelines for the Assessment and Management of

Childhood Lead Exposure (2024), incorporated by reference as published by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, PO Box 570, Jefferson City, MO 65102-0570, and available at <https://health.mo.gov/living/environment/lead/pdf/recommended-actions-guide.pdf>. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

(7) Blood Lead Specimen Collection and Laboratory Analysis.

(A) Blood lead specimens shall be obtained using federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act (CLIA) certified collection devices and protocols unless specifically waived by CLIA.

(B) Laboratories shall be CLIA certified to analyze venous blood specimens.

(C) Health care professionals shall follow the certified laboratory's criteria and protocols for collecting and submitting blood lead specimens.

(8) Reporting of Blood Lead Testing Results.

(A) Health care professionals performing blood lead analysis shall report to the department in accordance with 19 CSR 20-20.020.

(9) Medical Case Management Coordination of Childhood EBL Cases. For a child with an EBL, the –

(A) Primary care provider (PCP) shall –

1. Refer to Missouri Guidelines for the Assessment and Management of Childhood Lead Exposure;

2. Provide the parent/guardian with lead poisoning prevention education;

3. Collaborate with LPHA lead case managers or MO HealthNet lead case managers, environmental lead risk assessor assigned to the case, and Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC) staff as appropriate;

4. If chelation therapy is initiated, coordinate with the –

A. Lead risk assessor for a lead-safe discharge plan in accordance with the Missouri Guidelines for the Assessment and Management of Childhood Lead Exposure; and

B. LPHA lead case manager or MO HealthNet lead case manager for a health care discharge plan;

5. Provide the parent/guardian with education regarding the need for appropriate nutrition, hygiene, specific cleaning techniques, and safe methods for the removal or reduction of lead exposures;

6. Provide clinical evaluation for complications of lead ingestion/poisoning;

7. Facilitate and coordinate medical treatment services; and

8. Refer child for specialty services, including but not limited to WIC, First Steps, Head Start, and Missouri's Parent Education Program, as appropriate;

(B) Lead Case Managers shall –

1. Refer to Missouri Guidelines for the Assessment and Management of Childhood Lead Exposure;

2. Coordinate efforts with the PCP in addressing, scheduling, and documenting the dates and results of lead interventions as they relate to assessments and results of the child's iron status, nutrition, development, behavior, cognitive, physical, and social needs; and

3. Provide home or telehealth visits to complete health questionnaires and provide nutritional and developmental assessments when a child has a blood lead level equal to or greater than ten micrograms per deciliter (≥ 10 mcg/dL); and

(C) Environmental Lead Risk Assessors shall –

1. Refer to Missouri Guidelines for the Assessment and Management of Childhood Lead Exposure; and

2. Conduct an environmental risk assessment in accordance

with 19 CSR 30-70.620 when a child has a confirmed EBL equal to or greater than ten micrograms per deciliter (≥ 10 mcg/dL).

(10) Reporting Requirements of EBL Case Management Activities.

(A) The PCP providing case management for a child with an EBL shall provide information regarding each case to the department, LPHA, MO HealthNet lead case manager, and the licensed lead risk assessor as appropriate.

(B) The LPHA and/or MO HealthNet lead case manager shall document EBL case management information into the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services electronic reporting system.

(C) Lead case management information to be reported shall include –

1. Contact information of lead case manager;

2. Name of agency performing case management;

3. Child's full legal name;

4. Child's date of birth;

5. Child's residential address including zip code;

6. Contact information of parent/guardian;

7. Contact information of health care professional;

8. Contact information of lead risk assessor;

9. Description of coordination of services;

10. Date(s) of blood lead testing;

11. Laboratory blood lead test results, including initial and follow-up testing;

12. Date of diagnosis;

13. When chelation therapy is initiated, type of chelation medication, duration and method of administration, date of hospital admission and discharge information/instructions;

14. Interventions taken, including but not limited to parent/guardian education, nutritional supplementation, iron sufficiency testing and treatment, referrals for specialty services, and other associated testing such as abdominal x-rays and evaluations performed including results;

15. If applicable, date of transition of care due to change of address or insurance coverage; and

16. Date of and reason for closure of case management.

4 Health Educators salaries and fringe benefits = $78,720.81 \times 4 = \$314,887.24$
2. Medicaid covers approximately 66% of all case management cases. Local Public Health Agencies cover approximately 33% of case management cases.
3. Six county health departments employ risk assessors to conduct in home risk assessments for children with elevated blood lead levels. Salary \$57,460 x 68.25% = \$96,676.45 each. $\$96,676.45 \times 6 = 580,058.70$
 - a. This is not a true additional cost. This cost is already incurred by the rules that are being rescinded and this rule is replacing. NO additional cost is anticipated as these are already funded positions and NO additional positions are anticipated.
4. Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services employ five risk assessors currently and anticipate increasing the number of staff by one to perform the anticipated additional services. $\$57,460 \times 68.25\% = \$96,676.45 \times 6 = 580,058.70$
 - a. This is not a true additional cost. This cost is already incurred by the rules that are being rescinded and this rule is replacing. NO additional cost is

anticipated as these are already funded positions and NO additional positions are anticipated.

5. Medicaid already pays for testing and cost is based on a 3-year average of number of tests reported to the program.
 - a. This is not a true additional cost. This cost is already incurred by the rules that are being rescinded and this rule is replacing. NO additional cost is anticipated due to these changes.
6. Much of the costs listed for this program are already in place. Regulatory changes are estimated to cost the public between \$556,510 to \$653,187.

IV. ASSUMPTIONS

1. Case management is calculated on estimated staff to complete needed case management across the state. It is assumed lowering the level of case management to 3.5 will increase the burden 50%.
2. It is assumed that lowering the level where a risk assessment is required will increase case load, but not significantly and it is assumed that only one staff person would be needed to conduct additional risk assessments across the state.
3. Data from 2017, 2018, and 2019 were used to calculate a 3-year average number of Medicaid tests and a 2015-2019 birth cohorts were used to establish the number of children in the population under the age of 6.
4. It is assumed fringe benefits will be issued at the state rate of 68.25%.
5. Medicaid would be major supporter of the costs.
6. Most of these costs, except for one additional risk assessor for the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services are already costs that exist. These are not new costs however as this rule is replacing a rescinded rule these costs must be shown as if they are brand new. The chart below shows the current numbers based upon the current rule that this rule is replacing and the new numbers due to this rule.

III. WORKSHEET

1. OFFICE VISIT COSTS—Office visits, without the cost of the test, are estimated to cost between \$135 and \$188 per visit. Thus, the cost for office visits alone is estimated between \$4,696,445 and \$69,204,116. This number can vary based upon the office cost and the number of children who go in for the testing.
 - a. The proposed rule requires clinicians to offer anticipatory guidance about lead and lead poisoning prevention to parents with children under the age 6 and to offer testing to those children identified as high risk.
 - b. The federal government requires all children enrolled in Medicaid, ages 1 and 2, be screened for lead poisoning with a test.
 - c. On average, there are 368,107 children who meet the criteria for testing each year.

- d. On average the state is seeing that only about 10% of these children who are eligible for testing actually receive testing.
- e. If a child obtains this test during a well-visit, this is not an additional cost to the provider or anyone else, but it has been taken into account for the sake of transparency and all numbers and for the way things could potentially be coded.
- f. Given the anticipatory guidance is completed as part of the well-child check and is covered under the Early Periodic Diagnostics, Screening, and Treatment benefit, the costs reflected in this fiscal note are related to a well-child visit with preventative counseling.
- g. The American Academy of Pediatrics Bright Futures schedule recommends providing anticipatory guidance on lead poisoning prevention at each well-child check at ages 4 months, 6 months, 12 months, 18 months, 24 months, 3 years, 4 years, and 5 years.

Tests – based on the number of children eligible, traditional number of children who are seen who obtain lead testing, and the number of children seen on average for wellness visits who could receive a test if they so choose. Tests/Testing is estimated to cost between \$34 and \$42 per test, thus the cost for tests alone are estimated between \$1,251,564 and \$15,460,494 depending on the number of children who receive the test and the number of children who are on Medicaid. This number can vary based upon the office cost and the number of children who go in for the testing. Right now the state is seeing an average of about 10% of eligible children receiving the test. These numbers assume that all children who go in are covered by private insurance rather than Medicaid, thus the numbers are

higher than they really would be for private insurance providers as we know that at least some of the children who are obtaining these tests are on Medicaid.

Additionally, these costs are already being incurred, but as this rule is replacing a rule that is being rescinded all costs must be treated as though they are brand new.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

19 CSR 30-1.002 Schedules of Controlled Substances. The department is amending section (1).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates the Schedules of Controlled Substances to be consistent with 21 CFR Part 1308.

(1) Schedules of Controlled Substances.

(A) Schedule I shall consist of the drugs and other substances, by whatever official name, common or usual name, chemical name, or brand name designated, listed in this section. Each drug or substance has been assigned the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Controlled Substances Code Number set forth opposite it.

1. Opiates. Unless specifically excepted or unless listed in another schedule, any of the following opiates, including their isomers, esters, ethers, salts, and salts of isomers, esters, and ethers, whenever the existence of such isomers, esters, ethers, and salts is possible within the specific chemical designation:

20 CSR 2270-4.060 Minimum Standards for Supervision. The board is amending section (1).

PURPOSE: This amendment adds veterinary technicians and certified veterinary assistants to supervision standards and clarifies services that may be performed by animal chiropractic practitioners.

(1) Duties of the Supervising Veterinarian –

(A) The supervising veterinarian shall be responsible for determining the competency of the veterinary technician, veterinary medical candidate, temporary licensee, provisional licensees, veterinary medical preceptee, **veterinary technician student**, or unregistered assistant/**certified veterinary assistant** to perform delegated animal health care tasks;

(B) The supervising veterinarian of a veterinary technician, veterinary medical candidate, temporary licensee, provisional licensees, veterinary medical preceptee, **veterinary technician student**, or unregistered assistant/**certified veterinary assistant** shall make all decisions relating to the diagnosis, treatment, management, and future disposition of the animal patient; and

(C) The supervising veterinarian shall have examined the animal patient prior to the delegation of any animal health care task to either a veterinary technician, veterinary medical candidate, temporary licensee, provisional licensees, veterinary medical preceptee, **veterinary technician student**, or an unregistered assistant/**certified veterinary assistant**. The examination of the animal patient shall be conducted at such time as good veterinary medical practice requires consistent with the particular delegated animal health care task.

PROPOSED RULE

**20 CSR 4240-10.155 Affiliate Transactions Respecting
Electrical Corporations, Gas Corporations, Heating
Companies, Certain Water Corporations and Certain Sewer
Corporations**

PURPOSE: This rule is intended to prevent a Missouri Public Service Commission regulated electrical corporation, gas corporation,

heating company, water corporation (with more than eight thousand (8,000) customers), or sewer corporation (with more than eight thousand (8,000) customers) from subsidizing its nonregulated operations or its affiliates. In order to accomplish this objective, the rule sets forth standards of conduct, financial standards, evidentiary standards, access requirements, training requirements, and recordkeeping requirements applicable to any of these commission-regulated utilities whenever any such entity participates in a transaction with an affiliate (except with regard to HVAC services as defined in section 386.754, RSMo).

(1) Definitions.

(A) Affiliate means any person, including an individual, corporation, service company, corporate subsidiary, firm, partnership, incorporated or unincorporated association, political subdivision including a public utility district, city, town, county, or a combination of political subdivisions, which directly or indirectly, through one (1) or more intermediaries, controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with the covered utility. This term shall also include the nonregulated business operations of a covered utility.

(B) Affiliate transaction means any transaction between a covered utility and an affiliate. Affiliate transactions as defined by this rule shall also include all transactions carried out between any nonregulated business operation of a covered utility and the regulated business operations of a covered utility. An affiliate transaction for the purposes of this rule excludes heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) services as defined in section 386.754, RSMo.

(C) Affiliate Transactions Report means the filing that each covered utility is required to make with the secretary of the commission no later than each May 15, providing the information identified in section (6) of this rule, Recordkeeping Requirements.

(D) Control (including the terms “controlling,” “controlled by,” and “common control”) means the possession, directly or indirectly, of the power to direct or to cause the direction of the management or policies of an entity, whether such power is exercised through one (1) or more intermediary entities, or alone, or in conjunction with, or pursuant to an agreement with one (1) or more other entities, whether such power is exercised through a majority or minority ownership or voting of securities, common directors, officers or stockholders, voting trusts, holding trusts, affiliates, contract, or any other direct or indirect means. The commission shall presume that the beneficial ownership of ten percent (10%) or more of voting securities or partnership interest of an entity constitutes control for purposes of this rule. This provision, however, shall not be construed to prohibit a covered utility from rebutting the presumption that its ownership interest in an entity confers control.

(E) Corporate support means those functions dedicated to supporting the joint operations of a covered utility and some or all of its affiliates, including but not limited to the areas of corporate oversight, governance, support systems and personnel, payroll, shareholder services, financial services, financial planning and management support, human resources, employee records, pension management, legal services, research and development, information technology, accounting services, environmental services, internal audit, supply chain, regulatory affairs, facilities management, security, and community relations.

(F) Cost allocation manual (CAM) means the document that specifies the criteria, guidelines and procedures that the covered utility will follow to be in compliance with this rule. The CAM sets forth the covered utility’s cost allocation, market

valuation, and internal cost methods.

(G) Covered utility means, for purposes of this rule, an electrical corporation, gas corporation, or heating company as defined in section 386.020, RSMo, subject to commission regulation pursuant to Chapters 386 and 393, RSMo, or a water corporation as defined in section 386.020, RSMo, subject to commission regulation pursuant to Chapters 386 and 393, RSMo, with more than eight thousand (8,000) customers, or a sewer corporation as defined in section 386.020, RSMo, subject to commission regulation pursuant to Chapters 386 and 393, RSMo, with more than eight thousand (8,000) customers.

(H) Derivatives means a financial instrument with a value that is directly dependent upon or derived from an underlying factor. This underlying factor can be financial assets, real assets, indices, securities, debt instruments, commodities, other derivative instruments, any agreed upon pricing index or arrangement (e.g., the movement over time of the Consumer Price Index or freight rates), or the composition of these factors. Derivatives involve the trading of rights or obligations based on the underlying good, but may not directly transfer property. They are used to hedge risk or to exchange a floating rate of return for a fixed rate of return.

(I) Financial advantage means an advantage provided by a covered utility to an affiliate when the covered utility—

1. Compensates an affiliate for assets, goods, information, or services of any kind above the lesser of—

A. The fair market price (FMP); or

B. The fully distributed cost (FDC) to the covered utility to provide the assets, goods, information, or services for itself; or

2. Transfers assets, goods, information, or services of any kind to an affiliate below the greater of—

A. The FMP; or

B. The FDC to the covered utility.

(J) Fair market price (FMP) means a price determined by a covered utility as the amount it would pay or receive for receiving or providing a good or service in an affiliate transaction based on comparisons of similar transactions with, or the price of similar goods and services available from, unrelated third parties. A covered utility shall make such determination based on competitive bids, if feasible. If not feasible, surveys, third-party studies, specific price inquiries, benchmarking, or any other reasonable method may be employed for this purpose. For goods or services for which there is no readily available comparative market price, the price shall be the fully distributed cost of the entity supplying the goods or services. The covered utility shall have the burden of demonstrating its method of determining FMP is reasonable, and/or that there is no readily available comparative market price for a given good or service.

(K) Fully distributed cost (FDC) means a methodology that examines all costs of an enterprise in relation to all the goods and services that are produced. FDC requires recognition of all costs incurred directly or indirectly to produce a good or service. Costs are assigned either through a direct or allocated approach. Costs that cannot be directly or indirectly charged or assigned (e.g., general and administrative) must also be included in the FDC calculation through a general allocation.

(L) Information means any data obtained by a regulated utility that is not obtainable by nonaffiliated entities or can only be obtained at a competitively prohibitive cost in either time or resources.

(M) Long-term means a transaction in excess of thirty-one (31) days.

(N) Marketing affiliate means an affiliate that engages in or arranges a commission-related sale of any natural gas service

or portion of natural gas service to a shipper.

(O) Nonregulated operations mean assets, goods, information, or services of an affiliate or a covered utility not subject to the jurisdiction of the commission under Chapters 386 and 393, RSMo.

(P) Opportunity sales means sales of unused contract entitlements necessarily held by a gas corporation to meet the daily and seasonal swings of its system customers and intended to maximize utilization of assets that remain under regulation.

(Q) Preferential position means treatment provided by a covered utility that offers an affiliate an advantage that cannot be obtained by nonaffiliates, or can only be obtained at a competitively prohibitive cost in either time or resources.

(R) Shippers means all current and potential transportation customers on a regulated gas corporation's natural gas distribution system.

(S) Short-term means a transaction of thirty-one (31) days or less.

(T) Transportation means the receipt of natural gas at one point on a gas corporation's system and the redelivery of an equivalent volume of natural gas to the retail customer of the gas at another point on the gas corporation's system including, without limitation, scheduling, balancing, peaking, storage, and exchange to the extent such services are provided pursuant to the regulated gas corporation's commission tariff, and includes opportunity sales.

(U) Variance means an exemption granted by the commission from any applicable standard required pursuant to this rule.

(2) Standards.

(A) A covered utility shall not provide a financial advantage to an affiliate.

(B) A covered utility shall conduct its business in such a way as to not provide any preferential position to an affiliate over another entity at any time.

(C) A covered utility shall not participate in any affiliate transactions that are not in compliance with this rule, except as otherwise provided in the variance section (11) of this rule.

(D) If a customer requests information from the covered utility about goods or services provided by an affiliate, the covered utility may provide information about the affiliate but must inform the customer that regulated services are not tied to the use of an affiliate provider and that other service providers may be available. The covered utility may provide reference to other service providers or to commercial listings, but is not required to do so.

(E) Marketing materials, information, or advertisements distributed to Missouri residents by an affiliate entity that shares an exact or similar name, logo, or trademark of the covered utility shall clearly display in a font size no smaller than ten- (10-) point font or announce that the affiliate entity is not regulated by the "Missouri Public Service Commission."

(F) This section shall not apply to or prohibit any of the following unless found by the commission, after notice and hearing, that such practice is contrary to the purposes and intent of this rule:

1. The joint provision of corporate support services, at FDC, between or among a covered utility and any affiliate. This includes joint provision of corporate support services by an affiliated service company; and

2. The provision, at FDC, of goods, information, or services of any kind between or among a covered utility and an affiliate regulated by the commission or other state utility commission.

(3) Nondiscrimination Standards Respecting Gas Marketing.

(A) Nondiscrimination standards under this section apply in conjunction with all the standards under this rule and control when a similar standard overlaps.

(B) A regulated gas corporation shall apply all tariff provisions relating to transportation in the same manner to customers similarly situated whether they use affiliated or nonaffiliated marketers or brokers.

(C) A regulated gas corporation shall uniformly enforce its tariff provisions for all shippers.

(D) A regulated gas corporation shall not, through a tariff provision or otherwise, give its marketing affiliate and/or its customers any preference over a customer using a nonaffiliated marketer in matters relating to transportation or curtailment priority.

(E) A regulated gas corporation shall not give any customer using its marketing affiliate a preference, in the processing of a request for transportation services, over a customer using a nonaffiliated marketer, specifically including the manner and timing of such processing of a request for transportation services.

(F) A regulated gas corporation shall not disclose or cause to be disclosed to its marketing affiliate or any nonaffiliated marketer any information that it receives through its processing of requests for or provision of transportation.

(G) If a regulated gas corporation provides information related to transportation that is not readily available or generally known to other marketers to a customer using a marketing affiliate, it shall provide that information (electronic format, phone call, facsimile, etc.) contemporaneously to all nonaffiliated marketers transporting on its distribution system.

(H) A regulated gas corporation shall not condition or tie an offer or agreement to provide a transportation discount to a shipper to any service in which the marketing affiliate is involved. If the regulated gas corporation seeks to provide a discount for transportation to any shipper using a marketing affiliate, the regulated gas corporation shall, subject to an appropriate protective order –

1. File for approval of the transaction with the secretary of the commission and provide a copy to the commission staff counsel and the Office of the Public Counsel;

2. Disclose whether the marketing affiliate of the regulated gas corporation is the gas supplier or broker serving the shipper;

3. File quarterly public reports with the secretary of the commission that provide the aggregate periodic and cumulative number of transportation discounts provided by the regulated gas corporation; and

4. Provide the aggregate number of such agreements which involve shippers for whom the regulated gas corporation's marketing affiliate is or was at the time of the granting of the discount the gas supplier or broker.

(I) A regulated gas corporation shall not make opportunity sales directly to a customer of its marketing affiliate or to its marketing affiliate unless such supplies and/or capacity are made available to other similarly situated customers using nonaffiliated marketers on an identical basis given the nature of the transactions.

(J) A regulated gas corporation shall not condition or tie agreements (including prearranged capacity release) for the release of interstate or intrastate pipeline capacity to any service in which the marketing affiliate is involved under terms not offered to nonaffiliated companies and their customers.

(K) A regulated gas corporation shall maintain its books of

account and records completely separate and apart from those of the marketing affiliate.

(L) A regulated gas corporation is prohibited from giving any customer using its marketing affiliate preference with respect to any tariff provisions that provide discretionary waivers or variances.

(M) A regulated gas corporation shall maintain records when it is made aware of any marketing complaint against an affiliate. The records should contain a log detailing the date the complaint was received by the regulated gas corporation, the name of the complainant, a brief description of the complaint, and, as applicable, how it has been resolved. If the complaint has not been recorded by the regulated gas corporation within thirty (30) days, an explanation for the delay must be recorded.

(N) A regulated gas corporation will not communicate to any customer, supplier, or third parties that any advantage may accrue to such customer, supplier, or third party in the use of the regulated gas corporation's services as a result of that customer, supplier, or third party dealing with its marketing affiliate and shall refrain from giving any appearance that it speaks on behalf of its affiliate.

(O) If a customer requests information about a marketing affiliate, the regulated gas corporation may provide the requested information but shall also provide a list of all marketers operating on its system.

(4) Evidentiary Standards for Affiliate Transactions.

(A) When a covered utility purchases information, assets, goods, or services from an affiliate, other than those listed in subsection (2)(F) of this rule, the covered utility shall either determine a FMP for such information, assets, goods, or services or demonstrate why no reasonable FMP can be determined.

(B) In transactions that involve either the purchase or receipt of information, assets, goods, or services by a covered utility from an affiliate, other than those listed in subsection (2)(F) of this rule, the covered utility shall document both the FMP of such information, assets, goods, and services and the FDC to the covered utility to produce the information, assets, goods, or services for itself.

(C) In transactions that involve the sale or provision of information, assets, goods, or services to affiliates, other than those listed in subsection (2)(F) of this rule, the covered utility must demonstrate that it –

1. Considered all costs incurred to complete the transaction;

2. Calculated the costs at times relevant to the transaction;

3. Charged, assigned, or allocated all joint and common costs appropriately; and

4. Adequately determined the FMP of the information, assets, goods, or services.

(D) In transactions involving the receipt or purchase of information, assets, goods, or services by the covered utility from an affiliate, the covered utility will use a commission-approved cost allocation manual (CAM).

(5) Cost Allocation Manuals (CAM)

(A) Each covered utility shall maintain a CAM that sets forth cost allocation, market valuation, and internal cost methods and specifies the criteria, guidelines, and procedures that the covered utility will follow to be in compliance with this rule.

(B) Each covered utility shall file a CAM for approval by the commission as part of its first general rate case after the effective date of this rule, or in a separate filing no later than two (2) years after the effective date of this rule. Each covered

utility shall conduct periodic reviews of its cost allocation, market valuation, and internal cost methods, and shall update its CAM accordingly.

(C) Each covered utility shall file its CAM with the commission on or before May 15 each year as part of the covered utility's Affiliate Transaction Report. Included in the report should be a list of all affiliates regardless if services are provided to or services were obtained from the affiliate. The commission may, at any time, direct its staff to conduct an audit or review of a covered utility's CAM.

(6) Recordkeeping Requirements.

(A) A covered utility shall maintain books, accounts, and records separate from those of its affiliates.

(B) Each covered utility shall maintain the following information in a mutually agreed-to electronic format (i.e., agreement between the commission staff, the Office of the Public Counsel, and the covered utility) regarding affiliate transactions with affiliates on a calendar year basis and shall file such information in the form of an Affiliate Transactions Report with the secretary of the commission in the commission's electronic filing and information system (EFIS) and serve a copy on commission staff counsel and the Office of the Public Counsel no later than May 15 of the succeeding year:

1. A full and complete list of all affiliates as defined by this rule;

2. A full and complete list of all assets, goods, information, and services sold or provided to, or purchased or received from, affiliates;

3. A full and complete list of all contracts entered with affiliates;

4. A full and complete list of all affiliate transactions undertaken with affiliates without a written contract together with a brief explanation of why there was no contract;

5. The amount of all affiliate transactions by affiliate and account charged;

6. The basis used (e.g., FMP, FDC, etc.) to record each type of affiliate transaction, and a description of the method used by the covered utility to determine FMP;

7. A list of all affiliate transactions for which the covered utility could not determine a reasonable FMP, with explanations as to why a reasonable FMP was unobtainable; and

8. A full and complete listing of all affiliate transactions made pursuant to subparagraph (11)(A)2.B. of this rule.

(C) In addition, each covered utility shall maintain the following information regarding affiliate transactions on a calendar year basis:

1. Records identifying the basis used (e.g., FMP, FDC, etc.) to record all affiliate transactions; and

2. Books of accounts and supporting records in sufficient detail to permit verification of compliance with this rule.

(7) Records of Affiliates.

(A) Each covered utility shall ensure that its parent and any other affiliates maintain books and records that include, at a minimum, the following information regarding affiliate transactions:

1. Documentation of the costs associated with affiliate transactions that are incurred by the parent or affiliate and charged to the covered utility;

2. Documentation of the methods used to allocate and/or share costs between affiliates including other jurisdictions and/or corporate divisions;

3. Description of costs that are not subject to allocation to affiliate transactions and documentation supporting the

nonassignment of these costs to affiliate transactions;

4. Descriptions of the types of services that corporate divisions and/or other centralized functions provided to any affiliate or division accessing the covered utility's contracted services or facilities;

5. Names and job descriptions of the officers and managers, and only the job descriptions of such other employees that transferred or were transferred from the covered utility to an affiliate;

6. Evaluations of the effect on the reliability of services provided by the covered utility resulting from the access to regulated contracts and/or facilities by affiliates;

7. Policies regarding the access to services available to nonregulated affiliates desiring use of the covered utility's contracts and facilities; and

8. Descriptions of and supporting documentation related to any use of derivatives that may be related to the covered utility's operation even though obtained by the parent or affiliate.

(8) Access to Records of Affiliates.

(A) To the extent permitted by applicable law and pursuant to established commission discovery procedures, a covered utility shall make available the books and records of its parent and any other affiliates when required in the application of this rule.

(B) The commission shall have the authority to –

1. Review, inspect, and audit books, accounts, and other records kept by a covered utility or affiliate for the sole purpose of ensuring compliance with this rule and making findings available to the commission; and

2. Investigate the operations of a covered utility or affiliate and their relationship to each other for the sole purpose of ensuring compliance with this rule.

(9) Record Retention.

(A) Records required under this rule shall be maintained by each covered utility for a period of not less than six (6) years.

(10) Training.

(A) The covered utility shall train and advise its personnel as to the requirements and provisions of this rule at least every two (2) years, or more often if appropriate, to ensure compliance.

(11) Variances.

(A) A variance from the standards in this rule may be obtained by compliance with paragraph (11)(A)1. or (11)(A)2.

1. A covered utility may request a variance upon written application in accordance with commission procedures set out in 20 CSR 4240-2.060(4), except as provided in section (2) of this rule, and it may not engage in such an affiliate transaction until the commission grants the variance for good cause shown; or

2. A covered utility may engage in an affiliate transaction not in compliance with the standards set out in section (2) of this rule, on an interim basis, when to its best knowledge and belief, compliance with the standards would not be in the best interests of its regulated customers and it complies with the following procedures:

A. All reports and record retention requirements for each affiliate transaction must be complied with; and

B. Notice of the noncomplying affiliate transaction shall be filed with the secretary of the commission and a copy served upon the commission staff counsel, the Office of the Public Counsel, and any person or entity granted

intervention in the covered utility's most recent general rate proceeding, within ten (10) days of the occurrence of the noncomplying affiliate transaction. The notice shall provide a detailed explanation of why the affiliate transaction should be exempted from the requirements of section (2), and shall provide a detailed explanation of how the affiliate transaction was in the best interests of the regulated customers. Upon the filing of a covered utility's notice of the noncomplying affiliate transaction, the commission shall prescribe an intervention period, and order any interested party to file a request for a hearing regarding the noncomplying affiliate transaction within forty-five (45) days of the notice of the noncomplying affiliate transaction. Any affiliate transaction for which a variance is requested pursuant to this section shall remain interim, subject to disallowance, pending final commission determination on whether the noncomplying affiliate transaction resulted in the best interests of the regulated customers.

PROPOSED RULE

20 CSR 4240-10.165 HVAC Services Affiliate Transactions

PURPOSE: This rule prescribes the requirements for HVAC services respecting affiliated entities and regulated electrical corporations, gas corporations, and heating companies (covered utilities) when such covered utilities participate in affiliated transactions with

an HVAC affiliated entity as set forth in sections 386.754, 386.756, 386.760, 386.762, and 386.764, RSMo.

(1) Definitions.

(A) Affiliated entity means any entity not regulated by the Public Service Commission (commission) which is owned, controlled by or under common control with a utility and is engaged in HVAC services.

(B) Control (including the terms “controlling,” “controlled by,” and “common control”) means the possession, directly or indirectly, of the power to direct, or to cause the direction of the management or policies of an entity, whether such power is exercised through one (1) or more intermediary entities, or alone, or in conjunction with, or pursuant to an agreement with, one (1) or more other entities, whether such power is exercised through a majority or minority ownership or voting of securities, common directors, officers or stockholders, voting trusts, holding trusts, affiliated entities, contract, or any other direct or indirect means. The commission shall presume that the beneficial ownership of more than ten percent (10%) of voting securities or partnership interest of an entity confers control for purposes of this rule. This provision, however, shall not be construed to prohibit a covered utility from rebutting the presumption that its ownership interest in an entity confers control.

(C) Covered utility means an electrical corporation, gas corporation, or heating company as defined in section 386.020, RSMo, subject to commission regulation pursuant to Chapters 386 and 393, RSMo, and covered by this rule.

(D) Fully distributed cost (FDC) means a methodology that examines all costs of an enterprise in relation to all the goods and services that are produced. FDC requires recognition of all costs incurred directly or indirectly to produce a good or service. Costs are assigned either through a direct or allocated approach. Costs that cannot be directly assigned or indirectly charged or assigned (e.g., general and administrative) must also be included in the FDC calculation through a general allocation.

(E) HVAC services means the warranty, sale, lease, rental, installation, construction, modernization, retrofit, maintenance, or repair of heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) equipment.

(F) Utility contractor means a person, including an individual, corporation, firm, incorporated or unincorporated association or other business or legal entity that contracts, whether in writing or not in writing, with a covered utility to engage in or assist any entity in engaging in HVAC services, but does not include employees of a covered utility.

(2) Standards.

(A) A covered utility may not engage in HVAC services, except by an affiliated entity, or as provided in subsection (2) (G) or (2)(H) of this rule.

(B) No affiliated entity or utility contractor may use any vehicles, service tools, instruments, employees, or any other covered utility's assets, the cost of which are recoverable in the regulated rates for a covered utility service, to engage in HVAC services unless the covered utility is compensated for the use of such assets at the FDC to the covered utility.

1. The determination of a covered utility's cost in this section is defined in subsection (1)(D) of this rule.

(C) A covered utility may not use or allow any affiliated entity or utility contractor to use the name of such covered utility to engage in HVAC services unless the covered utility, affiliated entity, or utility contractor discloses, in plain view and in bold type on the same page as the name is used on

all advertisements or in plain audible language during all solicitations of such services, a disclaimer that states the services provided are not regulated by the commission.

(D) A covered utility may not engage in or assist any affiliated entity or utility contractor in engaging in HVAC services in a manner that subsidizes the activities of such covered utility, affiliated entity, or utility contractor to the extent of changing the rates or charges for the covered utility's services above or below the rates or charges that would be in effect if the covered utility were not engaged in or assisting any affiliated entity or utility contractor in engaging in such activities.

(E) Any affiliated entities or utility contractors engaged in HVAC services shall maintain accounts, books, and records separate and distinct from the covered utility's regulated operations.

(F) The provisions of this rule shall apply to any affiliated entity or utility contractor engaged in HVAC services that is owned, controlled, or under common control with a covered utility providing regulated services in the state of Missouri or any other state.

(G) A covered utility engaging in HVAC services in the state of Missouri five (5) years prior to August 28, 1998, may continue providing, to existing as well as new customers, the same type of services as those provided by the covered utility five (5) years prior to August 28, 1998.

1. To qualify for this exemption, the covered utility shall file a pleading before the commission for approval.

A. The commission may establish a case to determine if the covered utility qualifies for an exemption under this rule.

(H) The provisions of this section shall not be construed to prohibit a covered utility from providing emergency service, providing any service required by law, or providing a program pursuant to an existing tariff, rule, or order of the commission.

(D) Customer information includes information provided to the regulated utility by affiliated or unaffiliated entities.

(3) Other Notification Required Respecting Personal Customer Information.

(A) A utility shall notify staff counsel's office and the Office of the Public Counsel if there is an incident that warrants reporting to the attorney general of a "breach of security" or "breach" as defined by subsection 407.1500.1, RSMo, and the utility shall provide a copy of that report to the staff counsel's office and the Office of the Public Counsel.

During this period, the agency shall file with the secretary of state the order of rulemaking, either putting the proposed rule into effect, with or without further changes, or withdrawing the proposed rule.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed rule was published in the *Missouri Register* on July 1, 2024 (49 MoReg 989). No changes have been made to the text of the proposed rule, so it is not reprinted here. This proposed rule becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: No comments were received.

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Department of Social Services, MO HealthNet Division, under sections 208.201 and 660.017, RSMo 2016, and section 208.153, RSMo Supp. 2024, the division adopts a rule as follows:

13 CSR 70-94.030 is adopted.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed rule was published in the *Missouri Register* on June 3, 2024 (49 MoReg 810-814). Those sections with changes are reprinted here. This proposed rule becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The MO HealthNet Division received seventeen (17) comments on the proposed rule.

COMMENT #1: Jason Shenfield, CEO and President of PhelpsHealth (Phelps Health), comments that the term “ToRCH model” requires clarification.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: A sentence has been added as subsection (2)(j).

COMMENT #2: Phelps Health comments that the CIE platform requires further definition and that ToRCH entities are required to use the vendor selected by the division.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Such language has been added as paragraph (3)(B)2.

COMMENT #3: Phelps Health and Jon D. Doolittle, President and CEO of Missouri Hospital Association (MHA), comments that county sizes should be defined.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: This information has been added as paragraph (6)(B)1.

COMMENT #4: Phelps Health comments that the eligibility requirements to become a ToRCH entity should be moved to a different section.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: This change has not been made, but language has been added to clarify that the list in section (4) is not a list of eligibility requirements or obligations but rather a list of selection criteria that is part of the ToRCH application process. These items do not define a ToRCH entity.

COMMENT #5: Phelps Health and MHA comments that, due to the legal liability and financial commitment by the ToRCH entity, the role of the Leadership Board should be advisory only.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The intent of the ToRCH model is to enact community-wide strategies to improve population health by engaging primary care and community-based organization partners. All three of these groups are viewed as critical to the success of the model, and the expertise and vantage point of each must have a voice in the process. Moreover, the only downside risk is that the model works too well, reducing hospital volumes at the ToRCH facility more than the model returns. This being said, an edit has been made to subparagraph (4)(C)1.D. to acknowledge that voting policies should be designed in a manner that acknowledges the fiduciary responsibility and risk-bearing status of the ToRCH entity (e.g., the ToRCH entity might retain veto power on questions relating to financial risk or accounting).

COMMENT #6: Phelps Health comments that the roles and responsibilities of ToRCH entities and leadership boards appear to be conflated in section (4).

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: This is related to the earlier comment on section (4). The response is similar in that MHD clarifies that this section is not intended to spell out responsibilities in detail but rather to describe the application process. Additional language is added in reference to the comment about using the Community Health Needs Assessment to say that this requirement demonstrates knowledge of the region’s public health and population health challenges.

COMMENT #7: Phelps Health comments that the reference to the Participation Agreement should be non-specific.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The Participation Agreement will be incorporated by reference in keeping with section 536.021.2(3), RSMo. A copy of the participation Agreement will be made available at the MO HealthNet office and on the MO HealthNet website. An update to the Participation Agreement is being made for the purpose of data sharing as well as to address some public comments.

COMMENT #8: Phelps Health comments that data sharing is mentioned in several places but that formal data sharing plans are defined neither in the proposed rule nor in the referenced Participation Agreement.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: This omission is being rectified by adding language in subsection (5)(A), which further requires these details, including attestation requirements, to be spelled out in the updated Participation Agreement, which will now include a Business Associates Agreement.

COMMENT #9: Phelps Health comments that the language describing the payment methodology is not sufficiently clear.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Significant edits have been made to clarify the points raised in this comment.

Moreover, an appendix will be added to the Participation Agreement to provide a visual description and example, which are not appropriate for the regulation but will aid in the desire to develop a pro forma budget.

COMMENT #10: Phelps Health comments that it is not clear what limitations exist on how funds provided may be spent and/or distributed.

RESPONSE: Guidance to address these questions has been provided to the sites in separate documentation.

COMMENT #11: Phelps Health comments that the sections on avoidable visits and avoidable hospitalizations require significant revision for clarity. MHA comments similarly and adds that a mechanism is needed to avoid punishing the group of hospitals if one hospital performs extremely poorly.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: This section has been edited to clarify the method, algorithm definitions have been added to the Definitions section, and the method has been adjusted to address the concern raised by MHA. In the event that one or more hospitals experience worse performance than in the baseline year, their values will be zeroed out.

COMMENT #12: MHA comments that the formula for payment in the mature model, ToRCH(5+), does not include components for avoidable visits and avoidable hospitalizations, but that it should.

RESPONSE: MHD chose to sunset these components in the mature model due to their small size relative to the other measures. Given that they are expected to diminish further with focused effort during the first four model years, they will become more subject to noise in the probabilistic model. In general, these are measures that are difficult to reduce beyond a certain point.

COMMENT #13: MHA comments that a derivation of the actuarially fair PMPM should be provided, as well as other rate-related details. MHA also notes that the rate of \$0.17 appears to be incorrect.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Similar to the response to Phelps Health above, MHD notes that many clarifying changes have been made to the language in the Payment Methodology section. Furthermore, the sentence containing the \$0.17 has been deleted to avoid confusion. This number, though originating from the 1915(b) waiver, spreads ToRCH costs across all individuals covered by the waiver, which includes the entire managed care population. It has no real meaning for ToRCH budgeting purposes.

COMMENT #14: MHA comments that managed care plans should have a role and that the regulation should establish requirements for them.

RESPONSE: MHD agrees with this principle, but because the 1915(b) waiver that authorizes ToRCH is also the authority for the managed care program, coordination is already required by CMS. Contract language is being added to the managed care contracts delineating the requirements for coordination as well as expectations regarding data sharing, provision of other information such as programs that overlap with b3 services, and more. The suggestion regarding the streamlining of prior authorization processes is part of a larger conversation about ToRCH potentially improving communication between providers and health plans.

COMMENT #15: MHA comments that access to data on Medicaid participants in ToRCH counties is needed.

RESPONSE: This is being addressed, and an update to the Participation Agreement will include more details.

COMMENT #16: MHA comments that there appear to be differences between projected payment schedules provided to the ToRCH hospitals and the details of the draft regulation.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The edits to the Payment Methodology section should resolve this concern.

COMMENT #17: MHA comments that additional communication and/or regulatory language regarding compliance, the potential for audits, and any recoupment efforts should be provided by the state, with a preference that ToRCH entities be held harmless in the event of disallowance of federal matching funds.

RESPONSE: MHD clarifies that, in accordance with the approval of ToRCH as a PCCM model under Section 1915(b), ToRCH funds (with the exception of capacity building funds) are considered payment for Medicaid services. However, MHD is not able to hold ToRCH entities harmless from an audit or disallowance. All state and federal laws still apply to the ToRCH program and to all ToRCH entities. MHD will continue to ensure that program integrity is maintained as required by 13 CSR 70-3.030 and 42 CFR 455. Guidance documents for disbursing CBO Capacity Building funds and Screening & Referral funds have been provided to the ToRCH entities.

13 CSR 70-94.030 Transformation of Rural Community Health (ToRCH)

(2) Definitions. For purposes of this rule, the following words and phrases are defined as follows:

(A) "Community" shall mean a county or group of counties considered by the ToRCH entity as its core service region, and for whose health outcomes the leadership board will be held accountable;

(B) "Community Based Organization (CBO)" shall mean a public or private not-for-profit entity that provides specific services or resources to the community or targeted population within the community;

(C) "Community Health Needs Assessment" shall mean a community-wide assessment that identifies key health needs and issues through systemic, comprehensive data collection and analysis;

(D) Emergency Department Prevention Quality Indicators (ED PQIs) are measures developed by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) that assess whether visits for a set of chronic and ambulatory care sensitive conditions that could have been more appropriately treated in a primary care setting occurred;

(E) "Health-related social needs (HRSN)" shall mean an individual's unmet, adverse social conditions that contribute to poor health. These needs can include, but are not limited to—

1. Food insecurity;
2. Housing instability;
3. Unemployment or under-employment; or
4. A lack of reliable transportation;

(F) Pediatric Quality Indicators (PDIs), also developed by AHRQ, focus on quantifying potentially preventable complications and iatrogenic events for pediatric patients treated in hospitals and on preventable hospitalizations among pediatric patients, taking into account the special characteristics of the pediatric population;

(G) Prevention Quality Indicators (PQIs) are measures developed by AHRQ. A composite measure assesses whether hospitalizations occurred as a result of complications from

chronic conditions that would likely have been preventable due to better condition management;

(H) "Rural community health hub" shall mean a partnership among the ToRCH entity, primary care, behavioral health, and community-based organizations, to provide community-level care management services, including but not limited to strategic coordination of community-based services;

(I) "ToRCH entity" shall mean the leader of a rural community health hub that will provide community-level care management services, i.e., strategic coordination of community-based services that primary care partners are then able to utilize in a systematic way to more fully achieve the goals of primary care case management on an individual patient level. A ToRCH entity shall be located in a county deemed eligible for rural-targeted funding by the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy at the time of its application. Selection criteria for ToRCH entities are specified in section (4); and

(J) "ToRCH model" shall encompass the ToRCH entity and its partners, operating a rural community health hub, making strategic and data-informed decisions in order to earn value-based payments as described in this rule.

(3) ToRCH entities shall provide primary care case management (PCCM) services as defined at 42 U.S.C. section 1396d(t) (2011), as well as utilize a waiver under the *Social Security Act*, section 1915(b) (1921) to address HRSN at a rural community level. This includes but is not limited to –

(A) The strategic coordination of community-based services to allow primary care providers to utilize these services in a systematic way to more fully support positive health outcomes on the individual patient level;

(B) Engaging Community Based Organization (CBO) partners to participate in a Community Information Exchange (CIE) platform;

1. The purpose of the CIE platform is, in part, to allow ToRCH entities to locate HRSN services that case managers and other screening providers can use to better coordinate HRSN services across multiple CBOs, and to monitor enrolled participants in need of these services;

2. Furthermore, the CIE platform is designed to send referrals for HRSN services from medical or clinical providers to CBOs and track the resolution of each referral, to aggregate referral activity at the community level, to pre-screen for eligibility, to manage ToRCH model invoicing, and to assess ToRCH model performance; and

3. ToRCH entities shall agree to use the CIE platform designated by MHD; and

(C) Paying for HRSN services that correlate with better health outcomes and reductions in health care spending.

(4) ToRCH entity selection criteria.

(A) A ToRCH entity shall be located in a county deemed eligible for rural-targeted funding by the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy at the time of its application.

(B) A ToRCH entity shall be a hospital, a federally qualified health center, a rural health clinic, or a local public health agency.

(C) A prospective ToRCH entity shall apply to participate by submitting a Preparation, Approach, and Implementation Plan based on the following criteria:

1. Provide a well-thought-out plan for the creation of a Leadership Board to oversee and administer all aspects of the ToRCH model at the rural community level.

A. This plan shall identify the organizations and the individuals who the provider intends to participate in the

Leadership Board.

B. The Leadership Board shall include hospital leaders necessary to successfully administer the program, as approved by the division.

C. The Leadership Board shall consist of organizations across all domains (hospital, primary care, behavioral health, local public health agency (LPHA), and social care organizations).

D. The Leadership Board shall have a defined structure that includes voting policies for decisions related to ToRCH, defined meeting frequency, recording of minutes, and other procedures common to similar types of bodies and which acknowledges the fiduciary responsibility and risk-bearing status of the ToRCH entity.

E. The purpose of the Leadership Board shall be to harness the members' knowledge of their community and their clinical expertise to strategically focus on HRSN services likely to have the greatest influence on hospital outcomes and population health;

2. Provide a list of existing and potential partners with strong letters of support from at least one (1) from each domain: primary care, behavioral health, CBOs, and local public health agencies;

3. Demonstrate CBOs' current readiness and anticipated needs for support, including technical assistance;

4. Use a Community Health Needs Assessment (or other similar report) to identify the challenges and unmet needs of the community, demonstrating understanding of local population health concerns and providing a preliminary indication of which population health goals the community health hub may wish to prioritize through the ToRCH model;

5. Provide a written statement of commitment to data sharing among clinical partners, and indicate how data will be shared at the individual or aggregate level; and

6. Demonstrate a strong commitment by leadership through one (1) or more letters of support that –

A. Express a vision and enthusiasm for the model and a willingness to be held accountable;

B. Discuss the team (with relevant skills) who will be running the model;

C. Describe current efforts to screen/address Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) in the community; and

D. Describe insights gained from the interactive Community Information Exchange (CIE) demonstration or other data sources.

(D) A prospective ToRCH entity shall provide a narrative that demonstrates a full understanding of the ToRCH model as follows:

1. How the flexibility and customizability of the model will be used to address community needs that connect back to the overarching health goals;

2. The specific actions that the provider will take to achieve the health goals;

3. How data will be used to inform and guide efforts;

4. How course corrections will be made; and

5. How the strengths of the rural community will be leveraged.

(5) A ToRCH entity shall enter into a Participation Agreement with the MO HealthNet Division for the operation of a ToRCH program by the provider. The Participation Agreement (12/07/2023) is incorporated by reference in this rule as published by the Department of Social Services, MO HealthNet Division, 615 Howerton Court, Jefferson City, MO 65109, at its website at <https://mydss.mo.gov/mhd/ToRCH>, on May 1, 2024. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments

or additions.

(A) Participation agreements shall include details on data sharing requirements and responsibilities among ToRCH hub clinical partners and with the division, as well as enumerating requirements and responsibilities for financial reporting and attestation of ToRCH model activities.

(B) A Participation Agreement shall be valid only in geographic areas in which the division has approved the ToRCH entity under this rule.

(C) A Participation Agreement may contain additional terms and conditions agreed to by the parties if the terms and conditions are consistent with the provisions of the *Social Security Act*, section 1915(b) (1981) waiver, this rule, and relevant state or federal law.

(6) Payment Methodology.

(A) Payments to a ToRCH entity in good standing will vary over time. Payments in year N are indicated as “ToRCH(N)” and are determined according to the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{ToRCH}(1) &= \text{CBF}(1) + \text{CSS} + \text{SB3}(1) \\ \text{ToRCH}(2) &= \text{CBF}(2) + \text{CSS} + \text{SB3}(2) + \text{PH}(2) + \text{AV}(2) + \text{AH}(2) \\ \text{ToRCH}(3) &= \text{CBF}(3) + \text{CSS} + \text{SB3}(3) + \text{PH}(3) + \text{AV}(3) + \text{AH}(3) + \text{SS}(3) \\ \text{ToRCH}(4) &= \text{CBF}(4) + \text{CSS} + \text{SB3}(4) + \text{PH}(4) + \text{AV}(4) + \text{AH}(4) + \text{SS}(4) \\ \text{ToRCH}(5+) &= \text{CSS} + \text{PH}(5+) + \text{SS}(5+). \end{aligned}$$

(B) The components identified in subsection (6)(A) are defined as follows:

1. CBF – Capacity Building Funds. The amount in model years one (1) and two (2) is one hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) per year for a small rural county, two hundred forty thousand dollars (\$240,000) for a medium rural county, and three hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$320,000) for a large rural county. In year three (3), the amount is reduced by one third (1/3). In year four (4), the amount is reduced by two-thirds (2/3). In year five (5) and beyond, the amount is zero (0). These amounts are to be trended forward for inflation for additional cohorts after the first cohort and are to be awarded to local CBOs that agree to participate in the ToRCH model according to guidance established by the division. For purposes of this rule –

A. A small rural county shall mean a rural county with a population of less than fifteen thousand (15,000);

B. A medium rural county shall mean a rural county with a population from fifteen thousand (15,000) to twenty-nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine (29,999); and

C. A large rural county shall mean a rural county with a population of at least thirty thousand (30,000);

2. CSS – Community Strategy Services. This amount is comprised of two (2) actuarially-determined components to deliver community strategy services. The first is a base allocation that supports two (2), three (3), or four (4) full-time personnel (for small, medium, or large counties, respectively) to administer and manage the ToRCH model; the second covers screening and referral activities for MO HealthNet participants, multiplied by the most recent quarter’s enrollment data for the ToRCH county or counties, and payable quarterly;

3. SB3 – Supplemental B3 services and activities. In model years one (1) and two (2), this is a budgeted amount to be used by the ToRCH entity to provide supplemental services in accordance with section 1915(b)(3) of the *Social Security Act*. In year three (3), as the funding source for these services and activities begins to transition to Shared Savings (SS), the amount is reduced by one third (1/3). In year four (4), the amount is reduced by two thirds (2/3). In year five (5) and

beyond, the amount is reduced to zero (0);

4. PH – Population Health incentive payments. For each of the identified population health goals referenced in the ToRCH entity’s Participation Agreement, the Supplemental HRSN services budget will be increased by two percent (2%) if the goal for the prior year is met and by three percent (3%) if the goal is exceeded. Thus, the value of PH(2) equals up to fifteen percent (15%) of SB3(1). The value of PH(3) equals up to fifteen percent (15%) of SB3(2). The value of PH(4) equals up to fifteen percent (15%) of the sum of SB3(3) and SS(3). The value of PH(5) equals up to fifteen percent (15%) of the sum of SB3(4) and SS(4). The value of PH(6+) equals up to fifteen percent (15%) of SS(5+);

5. AV – Avoided Visits incentive payments. Based on calculations of avoidable Emergency Department visits, a pool is created across the ToRCH cohort, i.e., across all ToRCH entities that are in the same model year. Using Emergency Department Prevention Quality Indicators (ED PQIs), hospital services are probabilistically identified as potentially avoidable, and the dollar amount associated with these services is calculated at baseline and after each model year for services that occurred in the ToRCH hospital. The combined reductions achieved by all hospitals achieving reductions will comprise the Avoided Visits Pool. First, these changes are expressed as percentage changes for each hospital, negative numbers representing better performance. The percentage change for any hospital with worse performance is set to zero. Second, these percentage changes are summed to determine the total percent change across the cohort. Third, each hospital’s share of the total percent change is calculated as the ratio of the above two (2) steps. Fourth, this share is multiplied by the total value of the reduction achieved across the cohort to determine a prorated share of the reduction, assuming any reductions occurred, and the Pool value is therefore positive. AV for each hospital equals its prorated share of the reduction, or zero if the Pool value is zero. Original values for the first cohort will refer to calendar year 2023 measurements. (Note: if a ToRCH entity is not a hospital, then it will not participate in the Avoided Visits Pool.);

6. AH – Avoided Hospitalization incentive payments. Based on calculations of avoidable hospitalizations, a pool is created across the ToRCH cohort, i.e., across all ToRCH entities that are in the same model year. Using Prevention Quality Indicators (PQIs) and area-level Pediatric Quality Indicators (PDIs), hospital services are identified as potentially avoidable, and the dollar amount associated with these services is calculated at baseline and after each model year for services that occurred in the ToRCH hospital. The combined reductions achieved by all hospitals achieving reductions will comprise the Avoided Hospitalizations Pool. First, these changes are expressed as percentage changes for each hospital, negative numbers representing better performance. The percentage change for any hospital with worse performance is set to zero. Second, these percentage changes are summed to determine the total percent change across the cohort. Third, each hospital’s share of the total percent change is calculated as the ratio of the above two (2) steps. Fourth, this share is multiplied by the total value of the reduction achieved across the cohort to determine a prorated share of the reduction, assuming any reductions occurred, and the Pool value is therefore positive. AH for each hospital equals its prorated share of the reduction, or zero if the Pool value is zero. Original values for the first cohort will refer to calendar year 2023 measurements. (Note: if a ToRCH entity is not a hospital, then it will not participate in the Avoided Hospitalization Pool.);

7. SS – Shared Savings payments. Beginning in year three

(3), ToRCH entities will be eligible for shared savings payments based upon the estimated savings that MHD calculates as occurring through reductions in all-cause hospitalization (inpatient and outpatient) among the MO HealthNet residents of the ToRCH community. The estimate will be calculated relative to the utilization of MO HealthNet residents of rural, non-ToRCH counties and will be adjusted for the demographic composition of the county, including differences in enrollment by Category of Aid. To phase in the Shared Savings component of the ToRCH model, SS(3) will be, at minimum, equal to twenty percent (20%) of the calculated amount saved between years one (1) and two (2). SS(4) will be, at minimum, forty percent (40%) of the calculated amount saved between years two (2) and three (3). SS(5) will be, at minimum, sixty percent (60%) of the calculated amount saved between years three (3) and four (4). For N>5, SS(N) will be, at minimum, sixty percent (60%) of the calculated amount saved between years N minus two (2) and N minus one (1). When the PH incentive payments are added, the total shared savings rate may be up to seventy-five percent (75%);

(C) The Participation Agreement shall include detailed examples of the methodology described above, including trend rates and algorithms used, in order to ensure clarity for the ToRCH entities.
