Historical and Biographical Notes

Samuel Langhorne Clemens (1835-1910), better known by his pen name of Mark Twain, was a Missouri-born writer known for his humor and ability to capture everyday life in America. His most famous works are *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* and *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, both considered classic American novels. Twain was born in Florida, MO, then moved to Hannibal at a young age. *Sawyer* and *Finn* draw on his childhood experiences in Hannibal.

Scope and Content

The photographs are remarkable because they are among the few original images taken of famous author and Missourian Samuel Clemens, aka Mark Twain, at his hometown of Hannibal, Missouri. Twain returned to Hannibal briefly in May 1902, and two local photographers – Anna Schnizlein and Herbert Tomlinson – were able to capture him in front of his boyhood home.
