As a university student with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Brian provides suggestions for libraries on how to better support students on the spectrum. 

The <u>Toward Gigabit Libraries toolkit</u> is a powerful, FREE tool to help libraries learn about and improve their current broadband infrastructure and internal information technology (IT) environment. Using the toolkit helps library staff become better equipped to improve broadband services and become stronger advocates for their libraries' broadband infrastructure needs. The toolkit is designed for small, rural, Tribal and urban libraries with limited

Reference Services for YOU: Road Awareness with MoDOT

If you or your patrons have questions about roads in Missouri, check out the Missouri Department of Transportation's (MoDOT) publications and tools that inform the public on road conditions, transportation spending and construction projects around the state throughout the year.

- <u>Traveler Information Map:</u> Check road conditions online or in the app before driving. This map shows winter weather road conditions, planned events, work zones, flooding, traffic and incident reports.
- MoDOT E-updates and Text Alerts: Subscribe for statewide information and alerts for specific counties, routes, projects and more.
- Express Lane: Receive the latest transportation news and information via this biweekly newsletter as well as a video of news highlights.

- <u>Carpooling Connections</u>: Resources from commuter lots to carpool ride-matching assistance are available.
- Citizen's Guide to Transportation Funding:
 Access detailed information on the
 condition of Missouri roadways that
 describes revenue, costs and how Missouri
 compares to other states in transportation
 funding.
- MoDOT Results: View an accountability report measuring MoDOT's safety, service and stability progress throughout the year.
- Year in Review: Read an update on major projects, highlights and safety initiatives for the year, including the National Performance Report Card.

Stuffy Sleepover and Story Time at Mexico-Audrain County Library

A partnership between the Mexico-Audrain County Library and their local Altrusa International group resulted in the library's first ever Stuffy Sleepover and Story Time for children ages three to eight. As Library Director Christal Bruner reported, the Sleepover event was held on Friday, Dec. 13 with 27 children, along with their chosen stuffy. The child/stuffy duo visited four different areas of the library:

- A story area where they listened to and participated in several stories
- A craft area where they assembled Christmas crafts of their choice
- A snack area where children and parents picked out a snack to eat in the library or at home
- A check in area where each stuffy was given a nametag with a personalized QR code

Each child took a picture with their stuffy and picked out a Scholastic book to take home before saying goodbye to their stuffy for the night. That is when the fun began! All night long, the library posted photos of each stuffy's adventures while at home, the stuffy's child and parent could see them via the stuffy-specific QR code.





The library received overwhelmingly positive feedback from families whose stuffies stayed the night. One grandparent said, "When you do this again, I plan to bring all of my younger grandchildren to the event." Another child, who was unable to attend the in-person portion, asked that his grandparent take his stuffy to the library to enjoy the sleepover fun. Given the ongoing interest, the library is planning more stuffy events for 2025. Stay tuned!





Grant Opportunities

Educational Presenter Grant • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant and replaces the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their

community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY25 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.

Spotlight on Literacy Grant • Deadline: Feb. 28

Spotlight on Literacy is a programming grant, so programs must be the primary focus of your project and must span the length of the grant period – April 15, 2025 to March 31, 2026. Libraries can apply for funds to create new or improve current programs to serve patrons of all ages. Choose a single target audience as well as

a literacy area to address, such as civic literacy, cultural literacy, career literacy, early literacy, digital literacy, STEM literacy, health literacy, financial literacy, etc. See the award guidance for additional details. Applications are open and due on or before Feb. 28.

Digital Imaging Grant · Deadline: March 15

Digital Imaging grants provide funding for eligible libraries and their partners in the cultural heritage community to carry out projects involving the selection, digital capture, storage and provision of Web access to their important historical and cultural collections. These grants support creation of digital collections at institutions while at the same time adding expanded access to those collections via the Missouri Digital Heritage database and web site. The proposal must demonstrate the unique nature of the materials to be processed, show

how they can be characterized as original source materials and explain what value or benefit will accrue to the citizens of Missouri and other patrons by making them available in digital format via the Web. Collections should be generally representative of Missouri history and culture. It is important to demonstrate what demand exists for these collections already. A Letter of Intent was due by Jan. 15, and if approved, the grant application is due by March 15, 2025.

Technology Ladder Grant · Deadline: April 1 -

Public libraries eligible to receive SFY25 state aid can apply for funds to replace older technology or purchase new technology for projects that are intricate in nature and require more than five months to complete or to develop or redesign a

website for more effective service delivery. See the award guidance for information. This grant will open approximately Feb. 15, and applications are due by April 1.
