State Library News

Public Domain Day -

Jan. 1 of every year is Public Domain Day, and this year, copyrighted works from 1929 and sound recordings from 1924 enter the US public domain, meaning they can be used and shared freely without permission or fees.

While copyright laws protect works from being used without creators' permission, U.S. copyright laws also recognize that as time passes, there is a point at which works must no longer have strict rules against their use by others — 95 years for most works. This gives the public free access to works created a lifetime ago as well as the ability to turn the old new again without limitations, costs or restrictions.

Reference Services for YOU: State Budget Resources -

The Missouri General Assembly will soon start work on budget planning for the next fiscal year. Below are several helpful resources to assist patrons with reviewing past budgets, following state revenue and spending operations, and tracking current budget work.

House Operating Budget Process is a tracker for Missouri budget bills as they progress through the legislative appropriations process.

<u>Missouri Budget Explorer</u> is a transparency tool for departmental budget summaries, performance measures, priorities and additional budget information.

<u>Missouri Accountability Portal (MAP)</u> is a detailed database of tax dollars spent via department expenditures, state employee pay, budget restrictions, tax credits, federal grants and more. <u>State of Missouri Daily Spending</u> shows the daily activity and cash balance from the General Revenue Fund from the Missouri State Auditor.

<u>Show-Me Checkbook</u>, a financial data transparency portal from the state treasurer, utilizes historical budget information. Users can explore datasets from expenditures and liabilities to state employee payroll, and many datasets are formatted into shareable graphs and tables.

Appropriation Activity Reports offer comparative analyses of revenues to expenditures and appropriations to expenditures as detailed by the Office of Administration.

Around the State

Missouri Librarian Promotes Maker Community



In sixth grade, Jennifer Ensign's son developed an interest in coding, but in their small Missouri town, there were no real coding opportunities for kids his age. Determined to meet that need as the assistant library

director at Cameron Public Library, Mrs. Ensign spoke with her library director, JoEllen Pratt. With some grant assistance and a little planning, the library started offering coding clubs for children and youth in 2018. As interest grew, so did the library's offerings, which led Mrs. Ensign to discover a grassroots organization focused on helping librarians and other educators offer maker programming in their communities. <u>Makers in the Library</u> was founded by two educators in California and, in 2021, Mrs. Ensign became one of the group's charter members. Since then, this once small group has grown into a large <u>Library Makers</u> network with a presence in 49 states. There is no cost to join and members can download a <u>free toolkit</u> to help them plan their own maker program.

According to Mrs. Ensign, "Being a part of the Library Makers organization increased our confidence in the maker programming we provide and broadened our definition of Makerspaces. Makerspaces do not solely exist in huge library systems, with dedicated spaces that are always available for usage. They exist in every library, with open-ended crafts or STEM





projects, by providing opportunities to explore and create without fear of failure."

Libraries across Missouri are encouraged to explore the Library Makers community and to download the free toolkit to determine whether a maker program is right for their community. Librarians can even apply to become a Library Makers ambassador (more information about that in an upcoming newsletter). 




Kansas City Public Library's Monthly Zine

For about five years, Kansas City Public Library has released a mini monthly magazine, the Central Youth Services (CYS) Zine, made by their Associate Ronda Cornelius. The Zine's main goal is to highlight their collections, but Ronda also includes upcoming events for varying age groups along with facts, corny jokes, poetry, artwork, and puzzles related to that month's holidays and season within its sixteen pages. They're available at their CYS service desks or online, so patrons can enjoy and assemble them whether they come in the library or not. With some cutting, gluing and folding, patrons become a part of the zine-making process at their branch of the Kansas City Library and may even be inspired to create their own zines.

Clare Hollander, the central youth services manager, comments that "the Zine has been a delightful way to engage with our patrons who look forward to the release of each issue." The December issue explains the Dewey Decimal System and the Wolfe American Icebike,



features Crossword Puzzle Day and Amy Ludwig VanDerwater's "Snowflakes" poem, and highlights books galore of varying genres. We can't wait to see what fun their future zines contain!

Robotics Kit a Hit at Middle School

This fall, Coach Patrick Truman and School Librarian Gloria Fordyce at Lewis and Clark Middle School in Jefferson City introduced students to simple robotics using a LEGO® Education Spike[™] Prime Stem Kit borrowed from the Missouri State Library. As an Encore instructor, Coach Truman teaches Project Lead the Way (PLTW) courses, which apply science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) concepts to real-world issues. Coach Truman's students already had some experience with simple machines and coding; the Lego® robotics kit allowed them to take this knowledge further by building and programming their own working robot.

"STEM projects can bring together students from different peer groups who may never interact in other settings," says Coach Truman. These projects also reward persistence. "If it doesn't work, you gotta go back and make it work."

Grant Opportunities



Students Bradon Ellington and Madeline Barlow, both in 8th grade, enjoyed the experience of creating a working robot as part of Coach Truman's PLTW course. According to Bradon, the robotics kit was "beneficial because you're doing something different." Madeline added that it's "helpful because you get to build something and find the right pieces and put them together." Teachers interested in borrowing a STEM Kit should work with their school librarian who can contact the <u>Missouri State Library</u> for more information.

Educational Presenter Grant • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant and replaces the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY25 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.




