Voices in Autism -

The Missouri State Library in partnership with the Monarch Center for Autism, presents the *Voices in Autism* series. Every month we will have a short 5-10 minute conversation highlighting different experiences with autism. This month our mini conversation continues from last month with Mandi Rickelman and Jenna Winkelman. Mandi Rickelman, MA, is the Director of the Welcoming Spaces Program at Monarch Center for Autism, *a division of Bellefaire JCB*. The Welcoming Spaces Program hopes to increase the number of community-based venues that are able to successfully meet diverse sensory processing needs, provide helpful communication outlets, and deliver predictability

In 2023, with funding from the Mellon Foundation, the Brooklyn Public Library (BPL) launched a research project to collect and study cardholder signup policies from public libraries across the nation. Research findings have been summarized in a report made available to the library field beginning spring 2024.

Using these findings, BPL will convene a diverse working group of public library leaders in spring/ summer of 2024 to develop a policy framework of guiding principles and best practices for cardholder registration. The overall goal is to provide public library staff, leaders, boards and community stakeholders with the tools to have informed conversations about cardholder signup policies that align with the library profession's stated values of access and intellectual freedom.

The report and an interactive dashboard of the collected data is available at <u>Library Card Study</u>. WebJunction is hosting the webinar, <u>Cardholder</u> <u>Signup Policies</u>, on May 22 for a discussion about the inspiration for this study, how the research was conducted, and key findings and takeaways using data from more than 1,800 public libraries across the United States.

Public Libraries Respond to the Opioid Crisis with Their Communities -

The opioid epidemic was declared a national public health emergency in 2017, and the situation worsened due to the 2020 COVID pandemic. Provisional data from the <u>CDC National Health</u> <u>Statistics Center</u> show that from September 2020 to September 2023, opioid overdose deaths in the US increased by 19%, from 88,879 to 105,303. As community anchor institutions, public libraries are leveraging their assets in response to this crisis.

To aid staff at public libraries in determining how their library can address opioid use disorder in their community, WebJunction has developed the "Opioid Crisis Support Kit for Public Libraries." This resource will help strengthen libraries—and, more broadly, the communities they serve—as the nation continues to struggle with the opioid crisis.

The Support Kit was tested by staff in 15 public libraries across the US and enhanced by their feedback. The content includes pragmatic strategies, tools, and other resources to help libraries—including those in rural areas—as they determine their specific communities' needs and define the roles and activities their library is most suited to carry out. The kit will help libraries assess their staff strengths and capacity, identify key partners with whom to collaborate or coordinate, and plan and implement programming and services that support local needs.

The "Opioid Crisis Support Kit for Public Libraries" is in Word document format, so that you can save your work, thoughts and ideas. There are videos, readings, and activities specific to library work that you can learn from and explore.

Join Webjunction on May 16, for a <u>free webinar</u> to learn more about the Support Kit, how it was created, and how to use it. You'll also hear from library staff who participated in the early testing and who were able to implement new programs to meet local needs.

Many government agencies create high-quality, informative videos and podcasts to share information about their programs, projects and relevant topics with the public.

- <u>Nature Boost Podcast</u>: MDC podcast exploring health benefits, wildlife viewing, outdoor recreation and conservation stories.

- <u>GAO Watchdog Report</u>: The Government Accountability Office's (GAO) podcast features interviews with GAO officials about significant issues and news reports.
- <u>Before, During & After:</u> A podcast designed for emergency managers from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) with insight and conversations regarding emergency preparation.
- <u>Science in Seconds:</u> The National Institute of Health (NIH) weekly roundup of their research news in a short video series.
- <u>GSA Does That!?</u>: An agency-wide U.S. General Service Administration (GSA) podcast highlighting GSA projects and their impacts.

Jefferson County Library — "Dive In: Exploring the World of Water."

Patrons enjoyed an aquatic adventure throughout the month of March at Jefferson County Library (JCL) through the district-wide promotion "Dive In: Exploring the World of Water." "JCL staff poured a tremendous amount of effort into 'Dive In,'" said Library Services and Outreach Coordinator Cole Sawyer. "And it paid off. We saw a 26% increase in program attendance compared to our last promotion, 'Let Freedom Read' in October. I am so happy our patrons found a wealth of opportunity to learn, play, and explore the world of water throughout the month of March." Highlights included an interactive seminar about "Who Messed Up the Mississippi?" by the Mastodon State Historic Site, a "Wave of Change" created from recycled objects, and a visit from the St. Louis Aquarium, which drew 163 people across three branches. In total, JCL staff planned 58 programs and activities for the promotion.

"Personally, I thoroughly enjoyed attending the 'Fishing for Beginners' class at the Arnold branch," Sawyer said. "Now, I'm eager to grab

ScannX Book ScanCenter

In a step toward the library's vision to be "a hub of tradition and innovation, cultural preservation and promotion, and equitable access," the Genealogy Department of the Northwest Branch of the Jefferson County Library has acquired a ScannX Book ScanCenter through a Library Services and Technology Act grant. "In the brief time we've had it, it has become an invaluable tool with usage versatility beyond our expectations," said Ginger Brickey, head of the Genealogy and Local History Department at Jefferson County Library. The scanner enables the digitization of materials through a process designed to prevent the physical damage that a typical scanner can incur. The scanner's V-shaped cradle holds the book open at an angle, mimicking the way a book naturally lays open and thus minimizing stress on the book's spine and pages. Its high-resolution image sensors and adjustable settings capture clear images without the deteriorating effects of bright light and heat from traditional scanners or photocopiers. "We have the most extensive genealogy collection in Jefferson County, so it's crucial that we maintain our historical resources while ensuring accessibility for researchers locally and beyond," said Cole Sawyer, Library Services and Outreach Coordinator. "With the integration of technology, we're thrilled to enhance our capabilities in fulfilling these vital purposes." Library users can send images electronically, archive for online viewing, and



print physical copies." Acquiring this book scanner has been a tremendous leap forward to providing our staff and visitors with the most upto-date archiving and data-saving technology," Brickey said. "I am excited to build public programs around its use."

This project is a coordinated effort of the Genealogy Department, Northwest Branch Manager, IT Network Administrator, Accounting Department and Assistant Director for Library Services. This project is supported by the Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provisions of the LSTA as administered by the Missouri State Library, a division of the Office of the Secretary of State.

Grant Opportunities

Educational Presenter Grant • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant, and will replace the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY24 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.

Art Resources Transfer Library Program

This program distributes free books about modern and contemporary art to public institutions nationwide. Public libraries, schools, prisons, and reading centers in underserved communities are eligible to order free books from the <u>Art Resources Transfer catalog</u>.
