The Winter Reading challenge will run January 1 through February 28, 2025, and all books must be logged by March 10th to receive a completion prize and be included in the grand prize drawing.

Tips for Avoiding Fraud



Did you know that banks, the IRS, and legitimate businesses will never ask for your social security number, bank account information, or credit card information over the phone or in person? Millions of Americans fall victim to fraud each year. The top trending scams are: romance scams, where criminals pose as a romantic interest; criminals posing as technology support representatives; people claiming a relative has an urgent

financial need; or sweepstakes scams when criminals claim you have won a lottery.

Avoid "Act Now" scenarios, and never let a salesperson pressure you into making an immediate investment decision. Scammers might also tell you to pay in a specific way, such as wiring money or making checks directly to them instead of the third-party entity. Also, watch for the words "No Risk" with investments, because all investments have a risk, even if a small risk.

If you feel a friend or loved one has been the victim of securities fraud, contact the **Vulnerable Citizen Services Hotline** at **1-855-653-7300** to request a complaint form. Contact your local authorities immediately if the matter does not involve securities or an investment account. Furthermore, never give personal information to anyone over the phone.

Here's a list of books that will be featured for January and February followed by instructions on how to join in:

January 2 — *Vera Wong's Unsolicited Advice for Murderers* by Jesse Sutanto. (DB113039)

Vera Wong is a lonely little old lady, lady of a certain age who lives above her forgotten tea shop in the middle of San Francisco's Chinatown ... Then one morning, Vera trudges downstairs to find a curious thing, a dead man in the middle of her tea shop. In his outstretched hand, a flash drive ... after calling the cops like any good citizen would, she sort of swipes the flash drive from the body and tucks it safely into the pocket of her apron. Why? Because Vera is sure she would do a better job than the police possibly could, because nobody sniffs out a wrongdoing quite like a suspicious Chinese mother with time on her hands. January 9 — Starter Villain by John Scalzi. (DB118263)

Inheriting your uncle's supervillain business is more complicated than you might think. Particularly when you discover who's running the place. Charlie's life is going nowhere fast. A divorced substitute teacher living with his cat in a house his siblings want to sell, all he wants is to open a pub downtown, if only the bank will approve his loan. Then his long-lost uncle Jake dies and leaves his supervillain business (complete with island volcano lair) to Charlie. But becoming a supervillain isn't all giant laser death rays and lava pits. Jake had enemies, and now they're coming after Charlie... [8 hours, 14 minutes]

January 16 — The Hobbit, or, There and Back Again by J.R.R. Tolkien. (DB48978)

The wandering wizard Gandalf recruits Bilbo Baggins, a Hobbit, to be the fourteenth member of an expedition. Hobbits prefer comfort to adventures, but Bilbo joins the quest and encounters many perils, including a dragon. [9 hours, 25 minutes]

January 23 – Me: Elton John by Elton John. (DB97053, BR23869)

Memoir of the musical legend. Born Reginald Dwight in a London suburb, the performer soon found his sound and his style. He discusses his career and struggles with drug addiction. Also discusses his work with AIDS charities and his relationship with husband, David. [11 hours, 49 minutes]

January 30 — *I'll Be Gone in the Dark* by Michelle McNamara. (DB90637, BRG04241)

The late author's lifelong interest in true crime culminated in investigating the neveridentified serial-killing rapist who plagued California in the seventies and eighties,

whom she dubbed the Golden State Killer. This detailed telling of what she learned was completed posthumously by her researcher. Violence, strong language, and some explicit descriptions of sex. Bestseller. 2018. [11 hours, 40 minutes]

February 6 – System Collapse by Martha Wells (DB117861)

Everyone's favorite lethal SecUnit is back. Following the events in Network Effect, the Barish-Estranza corporation has sent rescue ships to a newly colonized planet in peril, as well as additional SecUnits. But if there's an ethical corporation out there, Murderbot has yet to find it, and if Barish-Estranza can't have the planet, they're sure as hell not leaving without something. If that something just happens to be an entire colony of humans, well, a free workforce is a decent runner-up prize... [6 hours, 39 minutes]

February 13 – *About a Dog* by Jenn McKinlay (DB89150)

The wedding of her best friend, Emma, brings Mac back to her hometown of Bluff Point, Maine. It is also the site of her own jilting at the altar seven years earlier. Emma's brother Gavin comforted Mac then, and he loves her still. Some violence, some strong language, and some explicit descriptions of sex. [9 hours, 22 minutes]

February 20 — American Sirens: The Incredible Story of the Black Men Who Became America's First Paramedics by Kevin Hazzard (DB116198)

Until the 1970s, if you suffered a medical crisis, your chances of survival were minimal. A 9-1-1 call might bring police or even the local funeral home. But that all changed with Freedom House EMS in Pittsburgh, a group of Black men who became America's first paramedics and set the gold standard for emergency medicine around the world, only to have their story and their legacy erased—until now. In American Sirens, acclaimed journalist and paramedic Kevin Hazzard tells the dramatic story of how a group of young, undereducated Black men forged a new frontier of healthcare.... [9 hours, 38 minutes]

February 27 — *Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry* by Mildred D. Taylor (DB10893, BR06283)

A turbulent year in Mississippi during the Great Depression—a year of night riders, burnings and threats. Cassie Logan, a young black girl, tells the story of her family's struggle to survive with their dignity and independence intact. For grades 6-9. Newbery Medal. [8 hours, 25 minutes] On the day of the book club, join by following the steps below:



New Braille Calendar Subscriptions

NLS provides Braille and print/Braille calendars to patrons free-of-charge. Calendars are available in two sizes. The larger wall calendar is print/Braille, and the smaller pocket-sized calendar is Braille only. You will get one each year once you sign up.

Changes to your Magazines on Cartridge Delivery

Wolfner Library is now producing and mailing magazine cartridges to our patrons. This should offer a timely delivery of your subscriptions.

There are two things to keep in mind:

Remove the Mailing Card to Return

Audio magazines on cartridge now come from Wolfner with a mailing card outside of the case that you must remove from the container to expose our return address, just like our audio books on cartridge.

New Colors for Cartridges and Cases

Your new magazine cartridges are green and have Wolfner Library and Magazines on them in print and Braille. They come in a grey case with the return address label under the mailing card. (This is why you remove the mailing card before you return.)

And remember, return cartridges as soon as you have read them to get your next magazine issues.
