If you are a Wolfner patron, participate in our weekly book club by dialing in every Thursday at 2:00 p.m., or by using Zoom from a smart device.

Here's a list of books that will be featured for June, July and August followed by instructions on how to join in:

June 6 — *Ordinary Grace* by William Krueger Kent (**DB078187**)

Minnesota, 1961. Thirteen-year-old Frank Drum's summer is steeped in death: a neighborhood boy hit by a train, a hobo found dead—and then a member of Frank's family is murdered. Frank is determined to seek vengeance and can't understand why his younger brother isn't. Some violence and some strong language. 2013. [11 hours, 44 minutes]

June 13 — *Palomino* by Danielle Steel (**DB017343**)

A dazzling New York advertising executive flees to a California dude ranch after being ditched by her husband, a nationally known TV anchorman. On the range, Samantha does more than just forget, she falls madly in love with a rugged cowboy who promises her nothing but the irresistible passion of the moment. Some strong language and adult content. Bestseller 1981. [10 hours, 42 minutes]

June 20 — The Wizard of Oz and The Land of Oz by Frank L. Baum (DB015141)

Blown by a cyclone from her Kansas home to the wonderful Land of Oz, Dorothy meets the Tin Woodsman, the Cowardly Lion and other fantastic creatures. In *The Land of Oz*, Dorothy and a venturesome companion search for the lost heiress of the kingdom of Oz. For grades 4–7 and older readers. [7 hours, 21 minutes]

June 27 — *The Wager* by David Grann (**DB113965**)

On January 28, 1742, a ramshackle vessel of patched-together wood and cloth washed up on the coast of Brazil. Inside were thirty emaciated men, barely alive, and they had an extraordinary tale to tell. They were survivors of His Majesty's Ship the Wager, a British vessel that had left England in 1740 on a secret mission during an imperial war with Spain... As always with Grann's work, the incredible twists of the narrative hold the reader spellbound." –Provided by publisher. [8 hours, 33 minutes]

July 11 — Jimmy Buffet: A Good Life All the Way by Ryan White (DB111717)

A candid, compelling, and rollicking portrait of the pirate captain of Margaritaville—Jimmy Buffett. In *Jimmy Buffett: A Good Life All the Way*, acclaimed music critic Ryan White has crafted the first definitive account of Buffett's rise from singing songs for beer to his emergence as a tropical icon and CEO behind the Margaritaville industrial complex, a vast network of merchandise, chain restaurants, resorts, and lifestyle products all inspired by his sunny but disillusioned hit "Margaritaville." –Provided by publisher. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. [11 hours, 1 minute]

July 18 — The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store by James McBride (DB115655)

In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. When the truth is finally revealed about what happened on Chicken Hill... McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community—heaven and earth—that sustain us. –Provided by publisher. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller. [12 hours, 24 minutes]

July 25 — 1984 by George Orwell (DB073474)

Satire about an alternate London under a totalitarian regime overseen by the omnipresent Big Brother. Winston Smith, a Ministry of Truth bureaucrat, attempts an intellectual rebellion against the Party while he pursues an illicit romance. His actions lead to his imprisonment, torture and reeducation by the Thought Police. 1949. [13 hours, 56 minutes]

August 1 — *The War That Saved My Life* by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley (**DB080472**) A young disabled girl and her brother are evacuated from London to the English countryside during World War II, where they find life to be much sweeter away from their abusive mother. Commercial audiobook. For grades 4–7 and older readers. 2015. [7 hours, 40 minutes]

August 8 — *Tom Lake* by Ann Patchett (**DB116555**)

In the spring of 2020, Lara's three daughters return to the family's orchard in Northern Michigan. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the story of Peter Duke, a famous actor with whom she shared both a stage and a romance years before at a theater company called Tom Lake. As Lara recalls the past, her daughters examine their own lives and relationship with their mother, and are forced to reconsider the world and everything they thought they knew. –Provided by publisher. Strong language. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller. [11 hours, 26 minutes]

August 15 — *Matilda* and *The Fantastic Mr. Fox* by Roald Dahl (**DB031793** / **DB025380**)

Matilda is an adorable four-year-old genius totally unappreciated by her crass, dishonest, used-car salesman father, and her blowsy, bingo-playing mother. Neither her parents nor her older brother, Michael, can understand why anyone would rather read a book than watch TV! Matilda's life is made bearable by her chance discovery of the public library and dear Mrs. Phelps, the librarian. For grades 3–6. [4 hours, 18 minutes]

Three enraged farmers are determined to catch the wily old fox who helps himself to their chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese. For grades 3–6. [1 hour, 8 minutes]

August 22 — *The Only Woman in the Room* by Marie Benedict (DB093756)

Vienna, 1933. While acting in a play, Hedy Kiesler—soon to be Hedy Lamarr—draws the attention of industrialist Friedrich Mandl. Her beauty and marriage to Friedrich save her from the Nazis, and she eventually flees to Hollywood. But her true passion is science and inventing. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller. 2018. [8 hours, 57 minutes]

August 29 — The Art of Racing in the Rain by Garth Stein (DB066787)

Enzo, a mixed-breed dog, believes he will be reincarnated as a human. He stands by his master Denny Swift's side through Denny's race-car driving career, the birth of his daughter Zo, the death of his wife Eve, and a bitter custody battle with Eve's parents. Some strong language. Bestseller. 2008. [9 hours, 11 minutes]

When he's the first of his friends to jump off the oak tree, he's on his way into the wide world, full of new experiences that fill his little heart with excitement! When a squirrel buries Acorn deep underground, he finds himself forced to stay still, in the darkness, for a long time. Fall 1949. When Gail Albright begins junior high at the nearby town of Craigsburg, she has no idea of the struggles and friendships she will find. After her first taste of humiliation, she must find a way to overcome her embarrassment and anger. With a little help from her friends, Gail might just pull it off. For Junior and Senior High. [5 hours, 21 minutes]

Hello Summer! by Shelley Rotner. (DBC29203)

Narrated by Maggie Barnes.

Whether biting into a juicy peach, dropping a fishing line in a pond, or splashing at the beach, these crisp, gorgeous photos of children celebrate quintessential moments of summer. For preschool–grade 2. [5 minutes]

The Listening Walk by Paul Showers. (DBC29200)

Narrated by Griffin Lyskowski.

A little girl and her father take a quiet walk and identify the sounds around them. For preschool–grade 2. [10 minutes]

Saving Grace by Priscilla Cummings. (DBC24506)

Narrated by Lesley LePage.

When Grace's family is evicted from their Washington, D.C. apartment just before Christmas 1932, and she and her younger brothers are sent to a mission, Grace wonders what will become of her sick older brother, her pregnant mother and her out-of-work father. For grades 4–7. [6 hours, 42 minutes]

100 Things to Do in Lake of the Ozarks Before You Die examines this 91-year-old man-made recreation destination and the activities, attractions and amenities that developed around it. Valerie Battle Kienzle offers this carefully selected collection of places to see, things to do and unique opportunities. [3 hours, 12 minutes]

Dead Spirits: A Dakota Mystery by M.K. Coker. (DBC24454)

Narrated by Rick Wallis.

A corpse is discovered at Spirit Mound, a Lewis and Clark exploration site reputed to harbor evil spirits. Sheriff Karen Okerlund Mehaffey, newly married and wanting

nothing more than to jet off on her honeymoon, must deal with a clash of white and Native cultures over an archaeological dig at the mound. From dusty museums to colorful powwows, to backstabbing academia, Karen and Marek must dig far into the past for a killer in the present who's stirred ancient spirits—evil or otherwise. Enslavement and the Underground Railroad in Missouri and Illinois by Julie D. Nicolai. (DBC29162)

People enslaved in Missouri experienced the same horrors as those held captive in other states, and their stories of courage and perseverance are amazing. Author Julia Nicolai details these stories. [7 hours, 17 minutes]

Missouri Outlaws: Bandits, Rebels & Rogues by Paul Kirkman. (DBC29164) Narrated by Tom Steever.

Author Paul Kirkman traces the succession of Missouri's first few generations and how each contributed to the making of some of the most notorious outlaws and lawmen in American history. [4 hours, 9 minutes]

Missouri's Wicked Route 66: Gangsters and Outlaws on the Mother Road by Lisa Livingston-Martin. (DBC29167)

Narrated by Carol Scott.

Tracing Route 66 through Missouri represents one of America's favorite exercises in nostalgia, but its sordid history doesn't appear on postcards. Stop in at places along this trip through the more treacherous twists of the Mother Road. [3 hours, 2 minutes]

No One Saw by Beverly Long. (DBC29156)

Narrated by Louise Eggen.

When five-year-old Emma Whitman disappears from day care, there isn't a single shred of evidence to go on. A.L. and Rena will have to race to untangle a growing web of lies if they're going to find the thread that leads them to Emma...before it's too late. [10 hours, 27 minutes]

See President McKinley or Die Trying: A Victorian Whodunit by Fedora Amis. (DBC24474)

Narrated by Shelley Swoyer.

Jemmy McBustle is trying her best to be a journalist. However, neither her family nor her newspaper editor take her seriously. When Jemmy ignores all guidelines and goes undercover as a maid at a private asylum for the insane, she finds more than expected. [10 hours, 37 minutes]
