

**LSTA Grants Awarded  
March 2012**

**Technology Mini Grant - \$153,261**

**Bollinger County Library - \$7,160**

The Library will replace eleven desktop computers to improve network reliability and better meet patron technology needs.

**Cameron Public Library - \$2,606**

The Library will replace its online printer and stand-alone copier with a printer/copier that is more efficient and cost effective, providing improved service to patrons.

**Cedar County Library - \$3,383**

Based on recommendations from MOREnet, the Library will replace its server, switches, hubs and cabling. Replacing aging equipment will improve the network's speed and dependability.

**Doniphan-Ripley County Library - \$7,891**

The Library will replace its non-functioning microfilm reader with one that has improved clarity of image and updated features.

**Dulany Memorial Library - \$8,488**

The Library will replace six outdated computers with monitors and add four computers with monitors and two laptops to the library's network to better meet patron demand.

**Farmington Public Library - \$3,155**

The Library will create a portable computer training lab, purchasing five laptops and a digital projector, to facilitate onsite and offsite trainings. When not used for trainings, patrons will be able to check-out the laptops for extended use in the library.

**Kirkwood Public Library - \$12,851**

The Library will replace two self-check stations that are at end-of-life to continue to serve patrons in an efficient and effective manner.

**Little Dixie Regional Libraries - \$12,873**

The Library will purchase six AWE AfterSchool Edge computers with pre-installed digital learning software designed to improve student achievement for youth 6-14 years old. Three of the stations will be installed at the Moberly branch and one each at the Paris, Madison and Huntsville branches.

**Marshall Public Library - \$10,530**

The Library will replace its data server, two barcode scanners, and one public access and two staff printers to improve network efficiency and better meet patron demand.

**Mid-Continent Public Library - \$13,608**

The Library will purchase eight AWE Early Literacy stations for installation at eight of their branches. The stations will encourage development of reading, language and computer skills for young children.

**Missouri River Regional Library - \$2,859**

The Library will replace all the monitors in use in the Public Computer Center at the main building and at the Linn branch. The new monitors will have larger screens, better resolution and glare reduction to better meet patron needs.

**Mountain View Public Library - \$4,299**

The Library will replace its automation/web server as the current server is nearing end-of-life. This server will expand the library's capacity to better meet current and future needs.

**Neosho / Newton County Library - \$4,380**

The Library will replace four online public access catalog computers, one career/resume station computer, one genealogy research station computer and one printer to improve the library's technology infrastructure

**North Kansas City Public Library - \$10,922**

The Library will create a mobile computer lab and upgrade its SMART Board to better address patron and staff training needs. Classes provided by the library for the public will include resume-writing, basic Web searching, and introductions to Word, Excel and PowerPoint. The lab will also facilitate trainings for the public offered by library partners and be available to community organizations as needed and available.

**Richmond Heights Memorial Library - \$5,516**

The Library will replace three public access computers, two public monographic laser printers, one staff monochrome laser printer, two staff printers, one staff computer and one barcode scanner to ensure network efficiency and reliability. A color printer and network hub will be added to the library's technology infrastructure to better meet patron needs.

**Rolling Hills Consolidated Library - \$8,512**

The Library will purchase and install four Early Literacy Stations, two at each branch, to better meet patron demand.

**Saint Joseph Public Library - \$4,836**

The Library will add an ST ViewScan microfilm reader/scanner with a 28" rotating monitor with an accompanying computer to better meet patron demand. The ViewScan will have a large screen and image resolution capabilities to make it easier for people with visual impairments to use the machine.

**Springfield-Greene County Library District - \$7,485**

The Library will purchase twenty Chromebooks as a pilot project within The Library Center and Brentwood Branch Libraries. Ten Chromebooks will be cataloged and circulated at each branch. These devices should help compensate for the shortage of public access computers and electrical outlets, better meeting patron demand.

**Trails Regional Library - \$10,529**

The Library will install bandwidth management appliances at each of its branches to help improve the network's reliability, performance and productivity. These devices will perform deep packet inspection of all internet traffic, assigning a priority and adjusting the bandwidth flow as needed to best meet demand.

**University City Public Library - \$3,417**

The Library will purchase a fax/scan machine for public use to meet patron demand.

**West Plains Public Library - \$7,961**

The Library will replace its database and Web servers and upgrade its automation system. The new automation software will feature improvements in the public access catalog (PAC); add a Kids PAC for emerging readers; add a mobile application to connect users via smart phone; add photos of patrons into patron records; and add extended notes fields for staff.

**Technology Ladder - \$14,308**

**MOBIUS - \$14,308**

MOBIUS will add Vidyo videoconferencing capability to provide trainings to MOBIUS members via desktop computers and mobile devices. MOBIUS projects it will offer approximately 40 training sessions a year using this technology. Topics are likely to include Millennium modules, Evergreen software, and hot topics for librarians.
