

**LSTA Grants Awarded
February 2014**

Technology Mini Grant - \$124,135

Daviess County Library - \$6,334

The Library will perform a technology upgrade including mobile catalog access, self-checkout stations, and presentation stations that will be used for patron trainings.

Jefferson County Library - \$3,814

The Library will replace seven 2D barcode scanners in the self-check units and nine standalone 2D barcode scanners used at the staffed check-out stations and CASSIE print management kiosks. The new equipment will improve service and better meet staff and patron demand.

Kirkwood Public Library - \$7,344

The Library will replace twelve public use computers and upgrade the office software on all public use computers and one training computer. The new equipment will replace computers with obsolete operating systems and better meet their patrons' needs.

Little Dixie Regional Libraries - \$7,508

The Library will replace ten laptops that are at end of life and purchase an additional three. The laptops are for mobile computer classes offered at all library branches, the YMCA, and a program for seniors called Spice of Life.

Maryville Public Library - \$3,733

The Library will replace a malfunctioning copier with a color printer/copier unit for patron use and two receipt printers to be used at checkout.

McDonald County Library - \$9,048

The Library will upgrade its technology infrastructure to better meet patron needs and demands. This will be accomplished by purchasing ten public access computers and six staff computers to replace equipment that is obsolete.

Missouri River Regional Library - \$9,892

The Library will replace the front desk computers at their main and Osage branches to improve checkout efficiency.

Montgomery City Public Library - \$2,521

The Library will replace one switch and one firewall that are at end of life. The equipment will improve network responsiveness and dependability.

Park Hills Public Library - \$5,377

The Library will purchase seven computes and monitors. Six machines are to replace equipment with obsolete operating systems and one computer will be added for public use.

Richmond Heights Memorial Library - \$8,707

The Library will replace one staff computer and eight public use computers and monitors that have obsolete operating systems. Two switches and an uninterruptible power supply will also be replaced at this time to ensure network performance and reliability.

Schuyler County Library District - \$3,393

The Library will replace five public use computers and monitors that have obsolete operating systems and one public use printer that is at end of life. The upgrade will provide efficient and reliable computer service to the library's patrons.

Shelbina Carnegie Public Library - \$3,295

The Library will replace five public use computers that have obsolete operating systems, one public use printer that is at end of life and update office software. The upgrades will provide efficient and reliable computer service to the library's patrons.

Springfield-Greene County Library District - \$4,540

The Library will provide an interactive media center where patrons can create, produce, and edit their own audio and video projects. The media center will provide a foundation for patrons to stay current with constantly changing technology.

St. Joseph Public Library - \$12,000

The Library will acquire five children's literacy computers, two appropriate for children ages two through eight, and three appropriate for children ages six through fourteen. St. Joseph has been identified as a low literacy area and the equipment will be purchased in an effort to improve literacy skills in children.

Sullivan Public Library - \$2,851

A pre-survey of the library's patrons showed a need for additional public access computers and wireless printer access. The Library will address these needs by adding a printer, four laptop computers and upgrade office and security software for public use.

Trails Regional Library - \$6,754

The library will purchase and install a computer scheduling and print management system in all eight branches. This technology upgrade will automate the login/assignment procedure of the public access computers by allowing patrons to reserve the computers and release their own print jobs. In addition, patrons using their own wireless devices will have the ability to send print jobs to the library's network printer.

University City Public Library - \$15,000

The Library will upgrade its technology infrastructure to better meet patron needs and demands in the Youth Services department. This will be achieved by replacing nine public access computers and sixteen staff computers with obsolete operating systems.

Webster County Library - \$8,178

The Library will replace its microfilm reader/printer with a digital reader printer with features that address current needs and expectations.

West Plains Public Library - \$3,846

The Library will purchase a thin client server and devices to replace eighteen public use computers with obsolete operating systems. The thin client system will be a more efficient way for staff to install software and updates as well as provide faster more reliable service to patrons.
